COURSE DESCRIPTION: Emphasis is placed on developing the actor's understanding of his/her body as an instrument of expression. Movement is not just for "theatre majors" or those students who want to develop a career in acting. Movement training is for everyone! The course will incorporate a variety of techniques including, but not limited to, Williamson, Laban, Chekhov, and Alexander.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: To provide the student, through participation and exercises, an understanding and appreciation of the body and its movement. Students will:

- Explore techniques to release tension and identify habitual movement patterns
- Understand the connection between breath and movement, and how that effects the creative process in acting
- Increase freedom of movement and the ability to move within scenework
- Develop kinesthetic skills as they apply to performance by the use of time, weight, space, and direction
- Use constructive criticism to further develop an acting role
- Understand these basic movement principles and how to apply them to the student's choice of career or lifestyle

TEXTS: No textbooks are required for this class. Appropriate clothing during coursework, and performance "blacks" are required for performance.

ATTENDANCE AND LATENESS: This is a performance-based class. Attendance and punctuality are mandatory. The work of this course primarily happens during class time and cannot be made up privately. Tardiness is extremely disruptive and disrespectful to the creative process in an acting class. If you are absent or late, the following penalties apply.

Attendance Penalty Scale

0 absences + 20 points
1 absence 0 points
2 absences – 10 points
3 absences – 20 points
4 absences – 40 points
5 absences – 80 points etc

Lateness

Late – 5 points
Really late (over 25 minutes) – 10 points
More than ½ of class – whole class

If students are sick/quarantining, they can still receive class credit/attendance points by attending the synchronous class via Zoom. They will be required to be present, dressed, have their camera on during the whole class period, and to do all exercises. Students MUST arrange for online classes 24 hours in advance with their instructor. Classes will NOT be recorded for students to view at any time; the student must be present for the class period as scheduled by the university. The Zoom link for class attendance will be given when requested by the student.

I DO NOT accept late work. If you have an excused absence, the homework must be turned in via email or a classmate the day it is due, NO exceptions. If you are set to perform on a day you are missing due to an excused absence, you must exchange with a peer and it must be preapproved BEFORE the day of performance.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. **PARTICIPATION:** Please show up every day ready to work and willing to learn. This can be shown through your effort, willingness to try, energy level, enthusiasm, contributions, and self-discipline. Please take note that participation doesn't just involve you performing, but also your active participation as an audience member while your classmates are working.

2. **PRODUCTIONS:** View 2 Midwestern plays *The Glass Menagerie* and *Peter and the Starcatcher* and write a critique. These will be based on acting critique guidelines provided by the instructor. These must be TYPED, EDITED and 2 pages in length in Standard English with an introduction and conclusion. Failure to see a required play will result in a 100 point penalty. Your ticket is free to both of these shows with your validated Midwestern Student ID.

3. **PERFORMANCES:** Prepare and present multiple performance projects, as assigned by the instructor throughout the semester. These include a monologue, a midterm, and a final. Student will also be required to present a lesson plan for and lead the class through warm-ups once throughout the semester.

A list of suggested plays will be provided by the instructor, you may choose a role and scene or one will be assigned.

GRADING: Grading will be out of a total of 1000 points, based on the course requirements outlined above. You could at any time calculate your grade if you are organized and keep all of your assignments (which is a GREAT idea!)

GENERAL NOTES:

When attending theatre performances and class arrive on time, be attentive, quiet and respectful during performances.

Please note that there may be adult themes discussed, addressed, and explored through both script reading and acting scenes in this class. The instructor will be sensitive to all viewpoints, and also allow for free speech and expression. Student safety is the instructor's first priority. Feel free to discuss with her at any time.
