Course Description:

The focus will be on a practical use of music technology that the common music teacher will encounter. Topics include software for music notation, music recording, video editing, and basic website design, as well as information about mobile apps in various musical settings. May be repeated for credit. 3 credits.

Objectives:

- Basic understanding of music writing, audio and video software.
- Basic understanding of recording.
- Creation of a website
- Using internet resources.

Required Materials:

Digital Storage: A web-based data storage account, such as Dropbox or Google Drive, or a flash drive.

Headphones: Personal headphones for playback monitoring and editing.

Student Expectations/Conduct

Students are required to participate in all class activities and to utilize class time for working on projects related to this course. Students are to conduct themselves in a professional manner so that all students may learn without distraction and disruption. Class participation includes all classroom activities. Cell phones, iPods, or any other handheld electronic devices in use during class are not permitted. Use of school computers unrelated to coursework (browsing the internet, Facebook, Twitter, email, etc.) will not

be tolerated. Any violators of this policy will be asked to leave the classroom and will receive an absence for the day.

Attendance:

Music Technology is a hands-on course that requires students to participate in daily activities and projects. Subject units are cumulative in organization, building on previously learned concepts throughout the course. Therefore, attendance is crucial to personal development. Students may miss class twice without a final grade reduction. Each absence above the two allotted absences reduces the final grade ten percentage points. Nonparticipation in class equals one absence for each occurrence. Tardy arrival to class will count as ½ of an absence and will affect the student's grade accordingly.
