Course Description

This honor course will examine the genre of the fairy tale with the focus on the fairy tales collected by the Brothers Grimm. We will investigate how fairy tales have functioned as vehicles for exploring the human condition, for social and political critique, for entertainment, and education. We will discuss selected popular fairy tales, encounter lesser-known stories, and look at the many ways in which fairy tales have been adapted across time, across cultures, and in a wide range of media, including literature, and movies, with a particular focus on manga. We will analyze the chosen texts through a range of theoretical approaches, drawn from literary, cultural, film, and gender studies.

Goals

By the end of this course, we will have read and examined various fairy tales as well as their interpretations and adaptations to different contexts and media. You should have developed an understanding of intertextuality and transculturality, and acquired knowledge about the historical conditions that led to the collection and dissemination of fairy tales, in particular the Grimms fairy tales, worldwide. Furthermore, you should have gained a wider awareness of German fairy tales as well as other fairy tales that have originated elsewhere yet have become a staple in German cultures, as well as in other countries.

Learning outcomes

- Knowledge of a multitude of Grimms' fairy tales
- Understanding fairy tale themes, archetypes, and plot development and structures.
- Understanding of the concept of intertextuality and transculturality.
- Awareness of the difference between fairy tales and literary fairy tales.
- Knowledge of underlying socio-political contexts of fairy tales and historical conditions that led to the collection and dissemination of fairy tales in German-speaking countries and beyond.

Throughout the semester, students will improve their critical thinking skills through readings, class discussions, oral presentations, and reaction papers.

Textbook & Instructional Materials
