Course Description

The focus is on application of holistic nursing principles in the community. The focus is on the nurse in the community, putting prevention into practice and the promotion of wellness. Assessment and planning care to families, groups, and communities and application of the nursing process will be explored. Utilization of epidemiological data, local, state and national resources for community health, health promotion, disease prevention, health planning/teaching, cultural awareness and issues of diversity will be emphasized at the local, state, national, and global levels.

NURS 3853 Concepts in Caring for the Adult Client, NURS 3863 Concepts in Caring for the Pediatric Client, and NURS 3873 Concepts in Mental Health Care.

Co-requisites

NURS 4803 Concepts in caring for the acutely ill client; NURS 4813 Concepts in Leadership in nursing; NURS 4833 Concepts in caring for the child-bearing family; NURS 4842 Concepts in clinical reasoning and judgment.

To ensue that you familiarize yourselves with the textbook, there will be 7 online (open book) quizes over the upcoming class material that will close before class. This is worth 10% of your grade.

Learning Experiences

Students are expected to be self-directed in the acquisition of basic nursing knowledge. Learning activities available to students include:

- 1. Classroom activities: Information relevant to each unit of study will be presented in class either by the instructor or by guest lecturers. Students should come to class promptly prepared to participate.
- 2. Readings: Readings from the textbook are recommended for each unit.
- 3. Community Assessment / Windshield Survey / Photonovella: team project to evaluate a census tract within the community and present the results as a photonovella.
- 4. Risk Assessment / Behavior Change Project: This project will assess personal health risks and initiate a behavior change to reduce a risk.
- 5. Desire 2 Learn (D2L) is available for announcements (News), course materials, e-mail, testing and grade book. Students are expected to check D2L daily for course announcements.

Grading Policy

Grades will be based on whole number scores generated by D2L. Grades are NOT rounded up. Students must have passing scores in order to pass the course.

Exams

Exams will be given at scheduled class times. There will be three (3) unit exams comprising 65% of the course grade. The exam average must be at least 74% for the student to pass the course, regardless of the grades on the other course requirements. Should the student be absent from an exam, arrangements must be made according to the procedure found in the B.S.N. Student Handbook. Specifically, it is the student's responsibility to notify the course coordinator at least two hours prior to the exam. Failure to comply with this policy will result in a "0" for the exam missed. Any make-up exam may be different from the original exam and may include multiple choice, essay, short answer, true/false, and/or matching questions. There will also be 7 online textbook quizzes worth 10% of the course grade.

Students who do not achieve a passing score (74%) on an exam may schedule a meeting with Sherry Meek, Retention Specialist for additional study resources. Her office is located in CE 440B (phone 397-4503). Appointments should be made by email sherry.meek@mwsu.edu.

Attendance and Participation

Students are encouraged to attend all lectures. Students may be dropped from the course for excessive absences per University policy. Class attendance and participation count 5% of the course grade.

Failure Policy

Students must meet all course requirements. A grade of "F" will be assigned if requirements are not met. The faculty reserves the right to recommend to the Program Chairs, School of Nursing Chair and College of Health and Human Services Dean withdrawal of a student from the nursing program for health, legal, or academic reasons. In addition, the student must perform within the ANA Standards of Practice and Code of Ethics. The ANA Standards of Practice and Code of Ethics are posted in the Undergraduate Student Handbook.

Assignments

Detailed instructions as well as a grading rubric will be provided for each written assignment.

1. Community Assessment / Windshield Survey / Photonovella Students will self-select teams of four to complete a Windshield Survey and Community Assessment based on an assigned census tract. Instructions are given in detail under the Orientation module on D2L. That assignment counts 10% of your grade.

2. Risk Assessment / Behavior Change Project

This project has required assignments in assessing a health risk, and planning, implementing and evaluating a behavior change to reduce that risk. Each student will perform a personal health risk assessment and work to change a behavior to reduce a health risk and to improve their health this semester. Instructions can be found under the Behavior Change module in D2L and the completed assignment will be submitted to the Drop Box. This semester-long assignment is worth 10% of the course grade.

3. Online textbook quizzes

Seven online (openbook) textbook quizzes will be over chapters in the textbook related to upcoming class subjects. The dates these are due are listed in the calendar. They can be taken any time but must be completed before the listed closure dates. These quizzes count 10% of the course grade.

4. ProMED-Mail

In teams of four you will select a global disease outbreak and follow its development on ProMED-Mail. The first report will include information about the disease, method of transmission, symptoms and global outbreaks, with follow up reports on global outbreaks of the disease in subsequent reports. Each student in the team is expected to give a report. You will be given a form to keep track of the reports. This form will be submitted to the Drop Box when all members of the team have reported. Completion of these reports will count as class participation.

Online Courses

Two online courses are required this semester and count as class participation.

1. Culturally Competent Nursing Care

This course will be taken online anytime during the semester. Upon completion of the first 2 (out of 3) modules, the certificate will be printed and submitted to the Drop Box. Completion of this course counts as class participation.

2. Human Trafficking Prevention Training

The Board of Nursing is requiring all nurses to take this Texas Health and Human Services course before renewal of their licenses. You will take this online course and submit your certificate to the Drop Box. Completion of this course counts as class participation.

Late Assignments

Contact the instructor immediately whenever you determine that an assignment will be late. Grade adjustments and penalties will be given as warranted. Contact the instructor immediately if circumstances exist that will make your work late.

Communication

Because the faculty teach in multiple courses, please communicate through D2L e-mails that MUST indicate it is from "ACCEL -Student's Last Name" in the subject line.

All announcements for the course will be posted in "News" on D2L. If a student asks a question on e-mail that the rest of the class would benefit from, the response will be in "News" – NOT e-mail.

Students are to check e-mail and "News" regularly and to respond to messages within the week. The faculty is expected to respond to the course emails within the week it is sent. Faculty is not expected to respond on evenings/ nights / weekends.

Desire-to-Learn (D2L)

Extensive use of the MSU D2L program is a part of this course. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, and general course information.
