Exams

2 exams account for 60% of your final grade. Each exam is open book and will be taken online. These will consist of multiple choice, true false, short answer, fill-in-the-blank, and/or essay questions.

Quizzes

40% of Final Grade. A timed (30 minute), open-book, multiple choice/true-false quiz (10 questions per quiz) is given for each of the 14 chapters from your textbook. Quizzes are taken in D2L. The 14 quizzes will account for 40% of your final grade. The due date for each quiz is clearly indicated in the D2L calendar. Failure to complete the quiz before the due date may result in a score of zero. You can work ahead if you would like, however, do not email and ask for a quiz to be re-opened.

Exam 1

30% of Final Grade. Timed (1hour), open-book Multiple Choice/true-false and essay exam (50 questions per exam) will be given online in the D2L system. The exam accounts for 30% of your final grade. The due date for each exam is clearly indicated in the D2L calendar. Failure to complete an exam before the due date may result in a score of zero. You can work ahead if you would like, however, do not email and ask for an exam to be re-opened. Such emails will be deleted without response.

Exam 2

30% of Final Grade. Timed (1hour), open-book Multiple Choice/true-false and essay exam (50 questions per exam) will be given online in the D2L system. The exam accounts for 30% of your final grade. Change of Schedule
