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Course Description

Painting 3 focuses on the use of the human figure as both a technical challenge as well as a vehicle for emotional value, narration, and personal investment. The semester's work serves as a survey of figurative approaches and functions. 4 major projects.

Prerequisites: Art 2313 Painting I, Art 3303 Painting II

Assignments

Painting 3 continues use of oil from previous semesters, with emphasis placed on formal questions, anatomical color studies, and the figure within spatial contexts. Expectations are addressed through the assignment sheet, demos in class, online videos, and past student examples available on D2L. Students are highly encouraged to view online materials to resolve their own paintings.

Work Ethic and Studio Environment

Personal motivation and discipline are keys to a student's success in this course. These qualities are demonstrated by actions - such as preparation for each class, involvement in projects, discussions, and critiques, and reaching a strong level of finish according to project criteria. All work should be stored and transported in a manner that preserves it for critiques and portfolio reviews. Students should expect to spend at least six hours per week on homework in addition to studio/class time.

Students will be required to work within the painting studios only; no other rooms in Fain should be used due to safety concerns and clean up required. When doing so, be aware of other classes working times. You may, however, use a space outside of the university if such exists. Note proper ventilation, clean up, disposal of materials, and archival concerns if doing so.

Use studio space for class, open from 7:00 a.m. - 1:00 a.m. when the night monitor is present and 7:00 a.m. - 10 p.m. otherwise. See posted schedule when available.

Grading

Student work will be reviewed by means of formal critique evaluations and portfolio reviews. Students will be evaluated according to predetermined requirements for all paintings. Individual projects will have a grade weight attached when given to the class.

Late Work

Late work will be counted against, one letter grade for each class period after it is due. Example: An A grade is lowered to B after one period late, after two periods late the A is lowered to C.

Students should never miss a class critique. Apart from late grades on projects, this counts against overall participation.

Attendance

Students enrolled in the Juanita and Ralph Harvey School of Visual Arts must comply with the following department-wide Attendance, Absence, and Lateness Policy:

- Students arriving 10 minutes after class begins will be considered late, and will be counted absent.
- Three late arrivals count as a single absence.
- Students may be absent from class 3 times without penalty and without providing any documentation regarding the absence.
- If a student incurs a 4th absence, his or her final course evaluation will be reduced by a full letter grade.

- If a student is absent 5 times, whatever the reason, he or she will receive a failing grade (F) for the course, dropped from class roll, and be asked to stop attending class
- Students are required to remain in class for the entire class session. Students will earn an absence if they leave before the professor has dismissed class.
- Excused absences must be brought before me prior to the absence, or if later, the student must have supporting documentation (academic, medical, or family emergency) in the case of excessive absences.

Gallery Attendance Policy

- If the student cannot attend the gallery opening, they must meet following requirements:
- The student must write a paper on the artist exhibited in the Juanita Harvey gallery.
- The paper should emphasize the student's reaction to the work.
- The paper must be formatted in Times New Roman, 12-pt. font, and be double-spaced. The paper must consist of 500 words.
- The paper must be submitted to the art office one week after the exhibition opening.
- If the exhibition extends past the final class day of the semester, the paper will be due one week before the final class day of the semester.
- If a student does not attend the show nor submit a paper, their final grade will be dropped 3.3% per gallery opening.
- If a student misses all of the gallery openings and does not write a paper for each required exhibition, the student's final grade will be dropped by 10%.

Miscellaneous Class Notes

- No excessive use of charcoal and no dry pastels in Painting Classroom allowed. Keep dust to a minimum.
- Open studio hours for the Painting area is generally 7:00 am - 1:00 am (see posted signage for full hours). Students are not to be alone in rooms. Use M-cards or passcode to access if locked.
- In case of accident involving physical injury, report immediately to instructor or main office, or call police.
- Headphones are not acceptable during instruction, demos, critiques, or other portions of class that require full attention.
- Talking while working is also ok, if not a distraction to the class. There will be no talking while I am giving instruction, lectures, one-on-one help during studio time, etc. Talking during critique must pertain to the discussion.
- Also, make sure your cell phones are off; no texting. No audio or video recording unless permitted.
- We will have breaks during class. Do not leave unexpectedly. If you have an emergency or need to leave early, talk to me before doing so.
- Clean up is always required. Do not leave until you clean up your individual area. This includes clean up outside of class hours, weekends, etc.
