Course Objectives:

After completing this course, you will have a greater understanding of:

- 1. What psychology is and how it is applicable to both the world and us.
- 2. How we think, learn, and remember
- 3. How we interact with the world around us through processes like sensation and perception
- 4. Other areas of psychology including social psychology, industrial organizational psychology, and real-world applications.

Attendance:

This course has been planned as a face-to-face course for Fall 2024. I will use D2L for posting syllabi, course communication, course schedule, attendance, and gradebook. You should regularly check D2L and the email hosted via D2L for important course information.

Class attendance is **required**. If you do miss class, you will be responsible for the material you missed when absent. No make-up exams will be given **except in the case of an emergency**, such as a serious illness, a serious accident, or a death in the family. *You must verify your emergency with documentation*. ***You must contact me via email no later than 24 hours after the missed exam***. If you miss an exam without a valid excuse, you will receive a zero for the assignment. Students with more than four absences will be dropped from the course with a failing grade.

Course Requirements:

- 1. **Exams:** Students will complete **three** exams during the semester. Each exam will be worth 100 points for a total of 300 points (60% of your overall course grade). Exams will contain a mix of multiple choice and short response questions.
- 2. **Quizzes:** Students will complete 9 online quizzes throughout the semester. *No-make up quizzes will be given.* However, your lowest quiz grade will be dropped. Quizzes will be worth

12.5 points each for a total of 100 points toward your final grade. (20% of your final grade). Quizzes are open-book and are designed to encourage you to read each chapter. As such, quizzes may sometimes cover material that we are unable to fully discuss in class.

Quizzes are due Sundays by 11:59pm (see the course schedule below for due dates). *If you submit a late quiz within 5 days of the due date (i.e., by the Friday after the quiz is due), I will assign partial credit (10% off per day late). YOU MUST EMAIL ME TO REQUEST PARTIAL CREDIT. Failure to email will result in a grade of 0 for the quiz.*

- 3. Class participation/Attendance: Students get the most out of their college experience when they show up to class and actively participate. To facilitate class participation, we will randomly complete activities and/or discussions in class. Your participation grade will be based on your *participation in class discussions, general attendance, and completion of in-class activities*. Attendance AND participation is worth a combined 50 points towards your final grade (10% of your final grade). *YOU WILL NOT RECEIVE FULL CREDIT IN THIS CATEGORY IF YOU ATTEND CLASS BUT DO NOT PARTICIPATE!*
- 4. Research Participation: It is important that students of psychology experience the scientific nature of the discipline first-hand. All students in PSYC 2203 are required to participate in ONE of the following research related activities. *Only choose one You cannot receive credit for both!*
 - a. **Research study participation:** Participate in approved psychology research projects (**At least 90 minutes**). Research opportunities will be announced throughout the semester and are available at: https://msutexas.edu/academics/libarts/psychology/undergraduate-research.php. The deadline for research participation is May 5th, 2025. Studies completed after this date will not be counted. Successfully completing 90 minutes will be worth 50 points. Partial credit will be awarded (i.e., 45 minutes of research == 25 points). Research participation will account for 10% of your final grade.

b. Research Ethics Essay: Instead of participating in research, students may instead read an academic writing addressing research ethics in psychology. Following this, students will complete a 4 page, double-spaced, typed essay summarizing and reviewing the information. Tables, figures, and pictures do not count toward the page requirement. This essay must be submitted by May 5th, 2025. This essay will be worth 50 points.
