Syllabus Writing in Psychology Fall 2023

Required Texts:

American Psychological Association (2020). *Publication manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th Ed.).

Course Objectives:

- 1. Demonstrate proficiency in the use of electronic databases
- 2. Know the essentials of APA manuscript preparation (e.g., appropriate referencing, formatting, use of visuals, content criteria).
- 3. Write according to APA style guidelines (e.g., clarity, brevity, mechanics, grammar).

Attendance:

Class attendance is ***required.*** This might sound crazy, but regularly attending class is the best way to ensure that you do well on the final paper (less formatting errors, improved clarity, etc.). If you do miss class for a non-excused reason, you are responsible for figuring out what you missed. Don't expect me to follow up with you.

Excused-Absences: The only absences that will not be counted are absences for a mandatory, universitysponsored event or religious holiday. Written notification must be provided to the professor at least two days prior to the day of the event. Absences for religious holidays must be cleared through the Dean of Students. Students must inform the instructor of religious holiday absences by the 15th day of class.

You must verify your emergency with documentation. ***You must contact me via email no later than 24 hours after the missed exam**!* If you miss an exam without a valid excuse, you will receive a zero for the assignment.

Late Submissions on Writing Assignments:

Writing assignments submitted after the deadline (Topic Proposal, Article Summaries, Drafts, Final Submission, etc.) will lose 10% of their total point value per day they are late (e.g., 10 points will be deducted for an assignment worth 100 points, 20 points for an assignment worth 200, etc.). You have the deadlines now (see course schedule at the end of the syllabus), so start planning ahead now!

Make-up Exams:

No make-up exams will be given ***except in the case of an emergency***, such as a serious illness, a serious accident, or a death in the family ***OR*** in the case of a previously excused absence (see *Attendance* section above for what qualifies as an *excused absence*).

Course Requirements:

- 1. **Exams:** Students will complete ***two*** exams during the semester. Each exam will be worth 100 points and will assess knowledge of APA style, best practices for writing, etc.
- 2. Term Paper: You will select *any* topic in psychological research and will use this topic as the basis of an APA style manuscript that will 1) summarize results from various peer-reviewed papers on this topic while 2) critically evaluating the methods that the researchers employed. This will involve comparing and contrasting these results with each other with you ultimately indicating whether you believe the research summarized is valid and represents a real phenomenon based on available evidence OR if the research in question is methodologically flawed. Whatever you decide, it is important for you to *justify* your position in this paper! You may wish to talk about ethical considerations, whether the study used a non-traditional sample, etc. This paper should 10 12 pages in length (you will lose points for being too short or too long!) and you must discuss results from at *ten* different EMPIRICAL studies in psychology (e.g., published research in peer-reviewed journals not magazines, Wikipedia, etc.!).

In addition to comparing and contrasting articles, ***you must also provide meaningful critique/interpretation of each article! Think about how the different articles you are discussing relate to your research topic and how they fit together with one another.*** This term paper will be used to assess student progress towards course objectives. Two working drafts of the term paper will be required at various points in the semester (see the schedule below). More details will be posted on D2L. The term paper will be broken down into the following assignments:

- a. Topic Proposal (50 points)
- b. Annotated Bibliography and Article Summaries (100 points)
- c. Draft #1 (100 points)
- d. Draft #2 (100 points)
- e. Final Draft (200 points)

A list of topic ideas will be posted on D2L. You must topic proposals must be submitted to me by email no later than 9/1 (if you're reading this at the beginning of the semester, be thinking about your topic ideas now!). See course schedule for all deadlines!

Acceptable topics include: Violent media and aggression, learning styles, different types of therapies, the role of genetics and intelligence, implicit biases/prejudice, cognitive benefits of being bilingual, can people predict their memory abilities, the validity of personality testing, etc.

- 3. **Participation**: Classes are most productive when everyone contributes. Class participation (*50 **points***) will be assessed based on attendance, participation during writing days and class activities, and your contributions to class discussions.
- 4. **Extra Credit:** Extra Credit may be given at my discretion. However, any extra credit opportunities will be made available to the entire class. If you email me asking for extra credit, I'll probably just ignore your email....

Grades:

Your final grade in the course will be calculated based upon *800* total points.
