RADS 4912 Special Topics

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Course Description

Course Requirements

ARRT Content Specifications: There are 200 questions covering four main categories on the ARRT exam. These <u>content specifications</u> are clearly outlined on the ARRT website. For this assignment area, students will be required to submit 25 multiple choice questions to address a variey of the different numbered *sub*categories of each section. Students will also provide the correct answer and the source of each question (text book, review book, website, etc.). For example: the first question should specifically address the highlighted subcategory (Patient's rights). The second question would address 2. Legal issues. If there are fewer than 25 of those subcategories, the remaining questions may cover any content within the Main heading category (i.e., Patient Care). If there are more than 25 of that particular subcategory, the student may choose from any to total 25 questions.

Patient Care

- 1. Patient Interactions and Management
 - A. Ethical and Legal Aspects
 - Patient's rights
 - a. consent

Discussions: After submission of the previous content specifications, each student will submit a short FlipGrid (App) video to summarize and give examples of how the content area is specifically applied in the clinical setting. The discussion board can be accessed through the course navigation bar on the home page in D2L. Each discussion posting or section will have the prompt or topic of the assignment with the due dates. Each student will be required to post on D2L three (3) separate journal entries during the course of the semester. Each student will also

be required to comment on two (2) other student entries for each journal assignment. Totaling six (6) *reply* entries for the semester. There will be no requirement for a discussion on the Procedures section of the content specifications. Note: All journals entries and responses close at 11:59 pm. Rubric available on D2L.

<u>Article Reviews:</u> An article review is a writing piece that summarizes and assesses someone else's article. It entails understanding the central theme of the article, supporting arguments, and implications for further research. The student should submit a title page for the assignment (page 1), the article reference citation in APA format followed by the summation and review of the selected article (page 2). This should all be in a 12pt. sans serif font with 1" margins.

APA Format

An article can appear in academic journals, newspapers, and websites. You need to write bibliographical entries for the sources you use when writing an APA format article review:

- Web: Author [last name], A.A [first and middle initial]. (Year, Month, Date of Publication). Title. Retrieved from {link}
- Journal: Author [last name], A.A [first and middle initial]. (Publication Year). Publication Title. Periodical Title, Volume(Issue), pp.-pp.
- **Newspaper:** Author [last name], A.A [first and middle initial]. (Year, Month, Date of Publication). Publication Title. Magazine Title, pp. Xx-xx.

Registry Review Exams: Specified registry review exams will be administered on the Friday afternoons of each seminar date (see below). Each exam will be 100 questions to cover the content specifications as outlined by the ARRT exam for radiography.
