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Course Description

This course is intended for the distance education learner. An overview of drug use in society and as a social problem is provided. Preventing and treating substance abuse will be addressed. Laws regulating to drugs will be reviewed. The way various drugs work in the body, affect mood, thought and behavior will be covered. Specific drugs addressed in detail will be stimulants, depressants and inhalants, medications for mental disorders, alcohol, tobacco, caffeine, over the counter drugs, opioids, hallucinogens, marijuana, and performance enhancing drugs.

Program Objectives Graduates demonstrate the ability to:

Objective 1: Apply critical thinking skills, and empirical knowledge of a generalist social work practice in the initial assessment through goal setting, implementation, evaluation and termination.

Objective 2: Practice with the values, ethics and principles of the social work profession.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Recognize the difference between addiction, abuse, and other key concepts in substance abuse.
- 2. Understand the pharmacology, tolerance, and effects of legal and illegal substances.
- 3. Respect cultural differences in attitudes toward and use of substances.
- 4. Become familiar with substance abuse treatment and prevention.

Student Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the effects of drugs on behavior and how behaviors are influenced by psychological, social, and cultural variables.
- 2. Identify drug policies and regulations and their effects on social problems.
- 3. How drugs interact with the brain and nervous system to product effects on behavior, thoughts, and emotions.
- 4. Identify the difference between stimulants, depressants, and inhalants and how these compare to drugs used in treating mental disorders.
- 5. Discuss alcohol, how it affects the body and brain, and its influence on individual's relationships with others and impact on society.
- 6. Identify the psychological effects of over the counter drugs, tobacco, and caffeine.
- 7. Describe restricted drugs, such as opioids, psychedelics, marijuana, and performance-enhancing drugs.
- 8. Utilize resources in relation to prevention and harm reduction and discuss various policies and strategies implemented to prevent substance abuse.
- 9. Recognize the difference between addiction, abuse, and other key concepts in substance abuse.

Social Work Program Grade Policy

A course grade of below a C or an average of below 70% will be considered a failing grade. **Students must repeat social work courses in which they receive a grade of D or F**.

Discussion Board Participation:

As indicated in the course schedule, the instructor will post question(s) on D2L for the class. Unless specified otherwise, everyone should post an initial response to the question(s) and should also respond to at least two peer's posts. The discussion board is a mandatory component. Students are expected to read all discussion board instructions and rubrics and to participate actively throughout the semester. Students are expected to write formally (no shorthand or text messaging abbreviations) and use APA format and referencing where appropriate. There will be general questions relating to the chapter(s), case vignettes, current events, and/or watching a video and posting your response. Thoughtful responses, constructive critique of fellow students, and meaningful participation are expected. Please keep in mind the discussion board is a formal assignment and part of your grade.

Discussion Thread Participation:

As stated earlier, the discussion board is a mandatory component. Discussion questions will be posted on the discussion board. Typically, your initial post to the discussion assignments are due by 11:30 pm on Thursdays and your response to at least two peers' posts (you may respond to as many peers' posts as you want) are due by 11:30 pm on Saturdays. Due dates will change at times during the semester (especially during holiday weeks) so it is the responsibility of the student to follow the due dates listed in each weekly post assignment.

If anyone fails to do the initial posts and fails to respond to peers' posts for any three discussion threads he or she may be dropped from the course.

I will review your posts and responses and give individual feedback when grading posts. I may respond in the discussion thread to a select few posts and/or responses or respond collectively to the class. This does not mean only the posts and/or responses of those to whom I respond are good and other posts and/or responses are not good.

Note: If needed, changes will be made in the syllabus while the sessions are on.

Quizzes

Students will complete weekly quizzes by 11:30 pm on Fridays based on the required book chapters and unit notes as indicated in the class schedule. The quizzes are open book and notes, but there will be only 30 minutes to complete them. Quizzes cannot be made up if missed, and a grade of zero (0) will be recorded.

Drug Research Paper

Due **Nov. 3**rd: Students will complete a research paper on a drug, preferably one that is discussed in the text or is problematic in the student's geographic area. The paper must be double spaced, written in the format of the American Psychological Association (APA), and be no more than 3 pages in length (excluding title and reference pages).

The paper should address, at a minimum, the following:

- What is the history of the drug?
 Why is the drug a problem to society?
- What are problems or issues that surround the drug?
- How does the drug work? What are the adverse health effects of taking the drug?
- What are the psychological and physiological effects of the drug?
- What is being done to combat the adverse health effects associated with the drug?
- Are there any current treatments for addiction to the drug? How effective are they?

Papers must cite and reference at least one source other than the text book. Grading will be based on the quality of the writing, the quality of the information presented, and adherence to APA formatting. Papers will be posted for your classmates to view. This paper will be 20% of the final course grade.

Final Exam

Due **Dec. 2**nd: The cumulative final exam will be posted in D2L. The final will be 20% of the final course grade.

Late Work

Students who fail to post required assignments on time will receive a lower grade, and the ones who do not complete the assignments will receive a grade of zero (please review the time submission criteria on the rubrics for each assignment). If anyone fails to post an original post or replies for 3 or more assignments, they will be dropped from the course or will be given a failing grade. There are no exceptions to this rule.
