Catalog Description: SPCH 2423 Interpersonal Communication is the application of communication theory to interpersonal relationship development, maintenance, and termination in relationship contexts including friendships, romantic partners, families, and relationships with co-workers and supervisors.

Course Overview: Communication is the single most important tool we have to make sense of our world. Hence, the way in which we understand our own experiences and others is through the communication process. *SPCH 2423* will enable you to improve your theoretical knowledge of the interpersonal communication process while providing you with practical application skills to use both personally and professionally.

The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License to Carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
