Note: Final grades are rounded to the NEAREST whole number (0.5 rounds up, 0.4 rounds down). Grades will NOT be curved (adjusted) for students close to a cut-off between letter grades. A grade of C or better is required to enroll in BIOL 1234 Anatomy & Physiology II (see University catalog).

Lecture Unit Exams

- There will be four multiple-choice unit exams in class that make up for 90% of your lecture grade. Each one will be take online D2L within the dates and times specified. Online exams are to be treated with the same honesty as proctored exams. Notes, textbooks, internet resources etc. are not permitted during exams.
- No exam grades will be dropped.
- Integrity is expected from all students. Any action suspicious of cheating, attempting to cheat, or helping someone cheat (such as, but not limited to, collaborating on exams, using notes, having a cell phone or any electronic device out during an exam, or recording or communicating exam content to other students, plagiarizing or otherwise copying lab work) will result in a grade of zero. You may also be dropped from the course and ultimately reported to the Dean of Students for academic dishonesty.

Late or Missed Exams

- If you know in advance that you will be unable to take an online exam within the specified time period then you must notify the instructor **before** the exam date to reschedule a time.
- For unforeseeable occurrences:
 - A make-up exam will only be allowed if the student contacts the instructor during business hours **of the same day** that the exam was originally scheduled.
 - If a make-up exam is granted, it must be taken during the re-scheduled time slot.
 - Failure to contact the instructor within the accepted time or failure to take the make-up exam will result in a zero for that exam.

Homework

The remaining 10% of your lecture grade will come from chapter quizzes on D2L. You must log into D2L before the due date and time to complete the assigned quiz. Similar to the exams the quizzes consist of multiple choice and True/False questions that will automatically graded upon completion of the assignment.

At the end of the semester, the lecture and lab components of this course will be combined into a single weighted average, with 75% of the final grade coming from lecture, and the remaining 25% coming from lab.

Frequently asked questions about grades:

How do I know what my grades are?

- Lab grades will be posted to the Lab D2L page

How do I calculate my overall course grade so far?

• [(lecture average so far) x (0.75)] + [(lab average so far) x (0.25)] = Course Grade

Will you round my average?

• I will only round averages in instances where the average would normally and mathematically round up to the next number (such as in instances of 0.5 and higher). For example, an average of 89.5 will round to a 90.

Is there any extra credit I can do?

• No. Generally, I find that extra credit is unfair to students and discourages hard work from the start if students think they can make easy points with extra credit assignments.

Attendance Policy

In general
