Course Description

This course provides advanced, intensive practice in writing, listening, speaking, and reading Spanish with particular emphasis on vocabulary and cultural information likely to be encountered in the professional, educational settings of the bilingual (L1) and world-language (L2) classrooms. Additionally, this course assists students in preparing for the BTLPT and LOTE Spanish professional teaching exams. The course is conducted entirely in Spanish and is a combination of lectures, class discussions, and reading/writing/speaking/listening assignments.

Textbook & Instructional Materials

There will be no textbook for this class.

Students are required to bring a dictionary, a notebook, and red and black pen. All materials used on this class will either be created by the professor and the students or will come from the Internet.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students will be able to communicate and discuss in Spanish a variety of situations relevant to the bilingual (L1) and Spanish L2 classroom, including vocabulary used in teaching the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). They will be able to understand and discuss in Spanish details relevant to the school environment. Will be able to evaluate and discuss in Spanish information/situations likely to be encountered in professional, educational settings. Also, they will be able to infer meaning from oral/written communications in Spanish while exhibiting an appropriate level of cultural knowledge and sensitivity.

1. This class will be conducted entirely in Spanish, students are expected to participate in the target language (Spanish) at all times.

2. All classes will be conducted in the Language Laboratory (BW128) and the Multipurpose Room (BW127).

3. Attendance: please arrive on time, if you arrive ten minutes late you will be counted absent. There are no excused absences, you have the right to miss two classes, use this right wisely because you will be dropped from the class without further notification at the occurrence of the third absence. When the professor drops you from the class you will receive a grade of "F."

4. There are no make-ups for missed assignments.

5. Nor food or drink is allowed into the languages laboratory.

Participación en clase

In class participation will be graded in four different ways:

a) Class discussion: class discussions will take place whenever a reading had been assigned for homework and students are required to come ready to discuss what they read and to ask questions. Also, there will be class discussions about other different activities that will be assigned for homework. Students are required to come prepare to the class to talk, in Spanish, unless directed otherwise.

b) Prácticas: There will be constant practices of Speaking, Writing, Reading, and Talking abilities, a participation grade will be applied each day to each student that will reflect her/his level of engagement as well as his/her evolution in such abilities through the semester.

Observación de clases

Each student will have to observe two different classes in two different languages of first or second semester level. They will observe a total of 4 classes. They will be given a template indicating what they have to observe, and they will be asked to add their own comments/observations. The observations will be in Spanish, German, and French. Professors Oxford, Lynch, Butler, Gagum, González, and Montoya, are willing to participate and take students as observers into their classes. No more than 3 students can be observing the same class at the same moment. Please choose the professor you would like to observe, and communicate it to Dr. Montoya for instructions. The observations have to be conducted within the last two weeks of February, from 17 - 28.

Entrevista a un maestro

You will be assigned a High School teacher to interview, whether in person or by phone. As a class we will come up with the questions to ask during the interview; however you will be asked to also improvise and add your own questions as the interview progresses. You will have to turn in the answers of your interview typed. The interview will take place within the first week of March.

Presentación oral / Teaching Sample

The first two Mondays of April, students are required to teach a mini-class to their peers. The teaching will be about a particular grammar/vocabulary aspect of the Spanish language. They will put in practice all the pedagogical elements learned during the course.

Diccionario Personal

One of the class objectives is to improve student's language competency, and vocabulary tends to be an important tool for such outcome. Students are required to have with them a personal dictionary of all the words they will learn this semester, inside and outside the classroom. The dictionary and its progress will be reviewed daily and words of such dictionary will be shared with the class on a daily basis.

Exámenes

Two major exams will be given during the semester, they will consist of different sections: Speaking, Writing, Reading, Talking, and Pedagogy. The exams will be similar in format to the LOTE (Languages Other than English) Examination.

Spanish Club

Language Clubs are important in the development of student's competency in a language, and the interest for another culture. Most High School Spanish teachers are involved in the organization and support of Spanish Club's activities. In this class you are required to participate in the MSU Spanish Club. You are invited to apply for an officer position, these positions always mold students' self-confidence and leadership skills; if you can't be an officer, still you are required to attend (and help) in a minimum of three activities during the semester.

Extra Credit

In order to obtain extra-credit, you will be asked to attend some University functions, particularly cultural activities. Please understand that extra-credit is volunteered and not mandatory. There will be some opportunities to attend events; however, there is no such thing as making up extra credit despite personal conflicts you may have.

Make Up Work/Tests

There will be no makeup exams, you have received the examination dates in advanced, please, plan ahead. If you know you should miss an exam due to an official university function, please make arrangements with your instructor prior to the absence and as soon as possible. If you are absent from an exam, you must present documented proof of illness or university activity to your instructor before an early or make up exam will be scheduled. Be aware that scheduling a make up examination is up to the discretion of your professor.

Change of Schedule
