Course Description

In this course, we will survey the key institutions of US and Texas government, including the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of government. This course is designed to give students a basic understanding of the inner workings of US political institutions and how these institutions impact your daily life through policy-making and implementation of previously passed laws and policies. During this course, we will look at how each of these branches of government are responsible for various aspects of governance, and how they interact with one another and with American society at large. In addition, we will examine the twin areas of civil rights and civil liberties provided within the US Constitution. Finally, we will also examine Texas government institutions, civil liberties, and civil rights as a complement and contrast to those at the national level. We will use political science to learn and reflect on which aspects of the system are functional and which are in need of improvement to better reflect modern society. The syllabus provides a general plan for the course; changes are sometimes necessary. Any changes may be announced in class and/or posted to D2L. The instructor reserves the right to reduce the number of assignments, and will readjust the grade calculations, which may result in assignments increasing in value.

Learning Objectives

- Identify the key structural features of the federal government including the Legislative (Congress), Executive (the President), and Judicial (the courts) branches.
- Identify the key structural features of the three main branches of government in Texas (legislative, executive, and judicial)
- Discuss the 13th, 14th, and 15th amendments and their implications as well as how they relate to civil rights.
- Learn the differences between civil liberties and civil rights, and give examples of each in the US and Texas constitutions
- Describe the policy-making process within both the US and Texas governmental systems

Student Responsibilities:

Discussion Boards

These are designed to replace the dialogue and conversations we would normally have in an inperson class. You have one discussion post due each week, usually by Thursday or Friday. Your replies are expected to be original, courteous, and completed to follow the directions for each discussion. The content will vary – some written responses, some memes, some video responses.

Reading Quizzes

These are to insure you are reading and understanding the assigned texts each week. Read thoroughly and take good notes; much of the exam material is based on the textbook content. The lectures will be to help you synthesize the concepts across the readings, and to fill in any gaps in the textbooks. The reading quizzes are posted in D2L, under the Quizzes tab. They are open book, with 10-20 questions each, and you have 20 minutes to complete each quiz, so you need to read and take notes before attempting the quizzes. Two attempts each quiz. There are four quizzes.

Lectures

You will watch narrated PowerPoint lectures, which can be accessed in D2L. The links open a new window for a closed YouTube channel that contains the lectures. Each lecture is approximately 15 minutes in length. The lectures will contain additional material not found in the textbook, so it is in your best interest to view these and take notes. Content on the exams will include lecture material.

Exams

There are three, multiple choice exams, taken online in D2L, open-book, and based on lecture content and textbook readings. Anything I say in in the lectures, along with anything in the assigned readings could be used for the exams. Most exams are open for a week. They are timed, so take careful notes and study before opening the exam. Once it is open, it must be completed. NO EXAMS WILL BE REOPENED AFTER THE DUE DATE HAS PASSED. Prior to the exams you must download the Lockdown Browser AND have a working and activated webcam. You will be recorded while taking the exam to avoid cheating such as having someone else take the exam for you.

Policy on Missed Work

There will be no makeup for the reading quizzes. Makeup credit for exams will only be given in cases of <u>legitimate and documented emergencies such as doctors excuses</u>, <u>college coach-provided travel</u> <u>schedules</u>, <u>or legal court attendance</u>. Do not miss these assignments unless there is a real emergency. All makeup work must be requested by email within 5 days of the regular due date, except for the last exam; this must be taken on time to avoid missing final grade requirements set by the registrar's office.

Withdrawal by midpoint:

Please note, the semester's midpoint is October 25. This is the last Day for "W". Students can withdraw from the class up to this point and receive a W for the class. However, there is a limited number of W's a student can receive over their academic career. Drops after this date will receive grades of "F." If you intend to withdraw from a course, you must do so yourself. If you are still on the roll when I have to assign grades and you haven't done any passing work, then you will fail. Also note, I have to report to the university whether students have attended class, and how

regularly you attend. If you have never attended this class when I have to submit my report to the university, or you have stopped attending, it is possible that the university will reduce your financial assistance.

Class Behavior Policies

In order to make this a successful class, it is important that we create an environment where everyone has an opportunity to learn. This includes online classes. To this end, you should know that the university policy on disruptive behavior in class applies.
