Course Description

The focus of this lecture course is to educate the respiratory care student in the principles and practices used in pulmonary rehab programs. Topics include but are not limited to, organization and management, candidate assessment and selection, patient and family education, smoking intervention techniques, role of home and alternate care sites, and reimbursement for services.

Course Objectives

- 1. State the definition and general goals of pulmonary rehabilitation programs.
- 2. Describe the rationale for exercise conditioning and psychosocial support of patients with chronic pulmonary disease.
- 3. Describe how to evaluate and select patients for pulmonary rehabilitation.
- 4. Describe pulmonary rehabilitation program design including format and content.
- 5. List the educational content to be addressed in a pulmonary rehabilitation program to include smoking cessation strategies.
- 6. Describe the implementation of a pulmonary rehabilitation program including staffing, facilities, scheduling, class size, equipment and costs.
- 7. Describe outcome measures that can be used to evaluate pulmonary rehab programs.
- 8. Identify the potential hazards associated with pulmonary rehab.
- 9. Describe recent developments and trends in alternative site respiratory care.

- 10. Discuss standards as well as documentation associated with alternate care sites.
- 11. Describe reimbursement patterns and limitations impacting alternate care sites.
- 12. State how to ensure safety and infection control in alternative patient care settings.

Examinations

Course exams may consist of definitions, multiple choice, true/false, fill-in-theblank, short answer, or essay type questions. Additionally exam grades may involve group projects and/or presentations as assigned by the instructor. This assignment is worth 50% of your overall grade.

Design a Campaign

As healthcare providers, we are frequently asked to educate our patients on ways to improve their respiratory health and promote healthy lifestyle choices. For this assignment, students will be required to design a health campaign designed to promote respiratory health. This campaign should include your targeted audience, health topic, communication methods, required resources, and anticipated outcomes. Your finished campaign will be voted on by the respiratory faculty for use in the 2023 Great American Smoke out Campaign. The rubric is shown below. This assignment is worth 15% of your overall grade.

Student Health Fair

<u>Health Fair Presentations-</u> As part of your project, you will create a project that summarizes, educates, and pertains to a specific topic that correlates with respiratory/health care. This project is 20% of your final grade. This project will be presented as part of the Midwestern State University Health Fair, which will be held on Friday March 4, 2022 from 9-12.

Participation and Discussion

Many of the topics covered in this course will be associated with group activities and/or online discussions. In order to facilitate the learning process, participation and completion of these assignments will be graded. In addition, students may be required to participate in Freedom from Smoking classes as a student facilitator throughout the semester. These assignments are worth 15% of your overall grade.
