Overview:

This course will provide an overview of American history from 1865 to the present with a focus on politics, society, military, and culture. The course emphasizes not so much dates and events but broad issues and themes that run throughout the American past. The end of the American Civil War was supposed to bring about major social, racial, and political changes but did not. A major theme of this class will look at how the legacies of the war can be seen today. America still grapples with issues of race, struggles between federal and state power, gender and sexuality, immigration, and class disputes. This course will look at ideas, events, and perspectives that are rarely discussed in high school courses and popular history. The idea of the American "dream" has been reserved for a select few, so we will look at how many have still yet to achieve it.

Goals:

- 1. Understand how history has shaped the society, culture, and world you currently live in specifically, you will learn about people, events, and perspectives that you most likely did not hear and read about in high school this class is not taught like a high school athletic coach would.
- 2. Learn to analyze primary documents to know their meaning and context
- 3. Learn to write: summarize ideas from primary documents and learning materials in your own words to answer critical-thinking questions

<u>**Texts**</u>: The reading assignments will be posted online via D2L. No AMERICAN YAWP.

1. Exams: Midterm (25%) and Final Exam (25%)

- 2. <u>2 Argumentative Essays</u>: 3 pages, double-spaced, Times New Roman, 12 pt font, default margins (don't mess with them). You will answer a specific question given to you in the syllabus. You must use 6 <u>different</u> primary sources from the syllabus no outside sources like Wikipedia 2 primary sources per page. More assignment details are given in the "<u>Instructions for the Argumentative Essay</u>" posted in D2L please follow this and don't go rogue, follow directions.
 - Essay 1: (25%) What is "America" as a nation and who belongs in America? NOT YOUR OPINION **use** the syllabus readings to inform your answers
 - Essay 2: (25%) What were some of the contradictions (hypocrisies) in American society? NOT YOUR OPINION <u>use</u> the syllabus readings to inform your answers

Letter and Number Grades: Number grades will be converted to letter grades according to the following: A+ (98-100) A (93-98), A- (90-93), B+ (88-90), B (83-88), B- (80-83), C+ (78-80), C (73-78), C- (70-73), D+ (68-70), D (63-68), D- (60-63), and F (0-60). Grades of A+ cannot be given as final course grades but will be assigned to exams that warrant them.
