Course Description

Criminology 3103 will introduce you to various theories that seek to explain criminal and antisocial behavior. As evident in cinema and television throughout the 20th century and to the present, much of the public is captivated and entertained with the topic of crime. Criminology seeks to explain the cause of criminal behavior through theories. Criminological theories may propose that crime is the result of deviant subcultures, poverty, strain, association with deviant peers, or even biological and genetic factors. This course will touch upon crime as a form of deviant behavior; nature and extent of crime; past and present theories; evaluation of prevention, control, and treatment programs.

Course Objectives

- 1. You will gain a good understanding of the academic discipline of criminology, its terminology, and research methods.
- 2. You will know how to apply the course teachings as you ponder crime or current events in the real world.
- 3. You will learn how to critically analyze both your own and others' points of view.

Exams

3 exams will be taken online. These will consist of multiple choice, true false, short answer, fill-in-the-blank, and/or essay questions.

Discussion Guidelines

Be sure to meet ALL the minimum requirements if you would like to earn an "A" on your discussions.

Discussion answers for EACH question must be a MINIMUM of 150 words. This is only the minimum. If you only complete the minimum, you are unlikely to receive full credit for the discussion. Thus, more than 150 words is highly encouraged.

Discussion answers must be posted (typed or pasted) directly to the discussion forum. If you prefer to type your answers in Microsoft Word, you must copy and paste your answers from Word to the Discussion Forum. Do not upload a Microsoft Word Document as you would an attachment in an email. If you do not post directly to the forum you will not receive any credit for the discussion. Your initial post must include your Discussion answers. You cannot see your classmates' posts until after you have posted your own answers.

A good discussion answer offers insight that goes beyond simply restating a few sentences directly from your textbook. In order to receive full credit for any given discussion you must provide a substantial comment/reply to at least 2 of your classmates' discussion posts for that week. This will help you gain a more thorough understanding of the content. Make an effort to

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expand the dialogue by reflecting on the topic with your thoughts, opinions, experiences, etc. The idea is to answer the questions in a manner that fosters discussion amongst your class mates. Replies such as "Good job!! I completely agree with your answer" are not substantial comments and will not be recognized.

The most important element of a good Discussion answer is that it specifically addresses all parts of the questions at hand.

Exam 1

Change of Schedule
