Goals/Objectives:

The goal of this course is to provide students with the foundational interview and interpersonal skills necessary for conducting counseling services. Students in this course are expected to learn basic interviewing skills pertinent to the provision of counseling from any theoretical perspective. To this end, it is expected that, upon completion of the core clinical block, students will:

- 1) Become acquainted with interviewing and counseling microskills;
- 2) Practice microskills in a safe environment with supportive feedback;
- 3) Demonstrate competency in counseling interviewing, rapport building, and targeted assessment (e.g., suicide assessment); and,
- 4) Be prepared to enter into supervised clinical practicum.

Student Evaluation:

Grades: Grades will be based on a 500-point scale.

Examinations: Three exams will be given during the course. Each exam will be comprised of short answer and essay questions. Each exam will be worth 100 points.

Clinical Experiences: In order to become comfortable with and practice the skills taught in this course, students will participate in a variety of role play situations. Role plays will vary in duration, ranging from 20-45 minutes. For Video 3 and Video 5 students will provide an annotated transcript of the session and self-evaluation of their performance. Students will earn up to 75 points for each of these assignments. For each of the other video assignments, students will complete a self-evaluation. Students will earn up to 50 total points for their completion of Videos 1, 2, and 4.

Psychology is not only academic, but also skills based. If a student should receive a grade below a B on the final clinical evaluation, I will ask another licensed faculty to review the final clinical evolution and confirm the final grade.

Attendance:

Class attendance is required. Each student is allowed <u>two</u> absences without penalty. Each additional absence will result in a 10% reduction in the students' final grade. Students will be responsible for the material they miss when absent. **No late assignments will be accepted**. Students with more than four absences will be dropped from the course with a failing grade.

Make-up Exams:

Make-up exams will be provided if necessary. Make-up exams will be oral exams conducted via Zoom during a 45-minute block. Exams must be completed within three class days of the missed exam.

Disability:

Any student who, because of a disability, may require special arrangements in order to meet the course requirements should contact the instructor as soon as possible to make necessary arrangements. Students must present appropriate verification from the University's Disability Support Services (DSS) during the instructor's office hours.
