Human Development: A Life-Span View (8th Edition) by Robert V. Kail & John C. Cavanaugh (2019)

Throughout the semester, I will post various readings on D2L. These will be posted at least two weeks in advance. It is your responsibility to have read the required articles *before* the appropriate class meeting. I will make announcements regarding when readings will be due.

Course Objectives:

After completing this course, you will have a greater understanding of:

- 1. The different stages of human development, from infancy to old age.
- 2. How Social, Emotional, and Cognitive factors change over the course of the lifespan.
- 3. The challenges that come with healthy aging as well as age-related disorders (e.g., Alzheimer's Disease, memory loss, etc.).

Attendance and Make-Up Exam Policy:

If you do miss class, you will be responsible for the material you missed when absent. Class attendance is ***required***. Each student is allowed ***four*** absences without penalty. Each additional absence will result in a 10% reduction in the students' final grade. Students will be responsible for the material they miss when absent. Students with ***more than five absences*** will be dropped from the course with a failing grade.

Excused-Absences: The ***only*** absences that will not be counted are absences for a mandatory, university-sponsored event or religious holiday. Written notification must be provided to the professor at least two days prior to the day of the event. Absences for religious holidays must be cleared through the Dean of Students. Students must inform the instructor of religious holiday absences by the 15th day of class.

No make-up exams will be given ***except in the case of an emergency***, such as a serious illness, a serious accident, or a death in the family ***OR*** in the case of a previously excused absence (see *Attendance* section above for what qualifies as an *excused absence*).

You must verify your emergency with documentation. ***You must contact me via email no later than 24 hours after the missed exam**!* If you miss an exam without a valid excuse, you will receive a zero for the assignment.

Course Requirements:

- Exams: Students will complete *five* exams during the semester. Each exam will be worth 150 points. Your final course grade will reflect your *four* highest exam scores (lowest score will be dropped). The final exam will be a cumulative review of the course.
- 2. Quizzes: Students will complete four quizzes throughout the semester. These quizzes will be conducted at random and are designed to help prepare you for later exams. Quizzes are extra credit and will be worth up to five points, which will be added to your *next* exam grade (i.e., the exam covering the same content on the quiz). *Make-up quizzes will not be accepted. No other extra credit opportunities will be given out!*
- 3. Article Responses: Students will complete four article responses throughout the semester. These will be two-page response papers that 1) summarize the article's content and 2) integrate information from the lectures, readings, and student's personal experiences. Your response must meet both requirements to receive full credit (i.e., submissions that only summarize the article will only receive half credit). Each article response is worth *50* points. *Readings will be posted on D2L.* Article responses are due by 11:59pm on their respective due dates (see schedule). Late responses will automatically be docked *five points for each day it is late.*
