COURSE DESCRIPTION: For the advanced student actor, this course places primary emphasis on the development of physical characterization techniques, participation in physical and vocal acting exercises, and practical performance application through stylistic scenework. Additional emphasis will be placed on academic reading, problem solving, and group participation in devised theatre creation in order to learn special skills such as physical listening, contact improvisation, object work, and image work.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: To provide the student, through participation and experience, with an understanding and appreciation of the arts and theatre. Students will:

- -Learn to read and analyze classical plays
- -Develop research skills necessary to create a character who <u>will</u> be from a different time, place, culture, and lifestyle than the student
- -Create and perform a character in four classical scenes and one lazzi
- -Develop oral and written critical skills for discussing performance
- -Use constructive criticism to further develop an acting role
- -Understand these advanced acting principles and how to apply them to the student's choice of career or lifestyle
- **TEXTS:** No textbooks are required for this class. However, you will be expected to read seven plays, as assigned by the instructor. You will receive links to these as they become available.

Other materials needed:

-Handouts provided by instructor

-Scenes from scripts

-Please note, for your Lazzi work you must be in all black clothing (long sleeve, long pants), with a black head cover. Instructor will tell you when to have these items in class. -For some scenework, you must arrange to have period appropriate clothing and/or props. Instructor will be helpful in arranging these things, but ultimately it us up to the student to ensure they are properly executing these performances.

ATTENDANCE AND LATENESS: This is a performance-based class. Attendance and punctuality are mandatory. The work of this course primarily happens during class time and cannot be made up privately. Tardiness is extremely disruptive and disrespectful to the creative process in an acting class. If you are absent or late, the following penalties apply:

If students are sick/quarantining, they can still receive class credit/attendance points by attending the synchronous class via Zoom. They will be required to be present, dressed, have their camera on during the whole class period, and to do all exercises. Students MUST arrange for online classes 24 hours in advance with their instructor. Classes will NOT be recorded for students to view at any time; the student must be present for the class period as scheduled by the university. The Zoom link for class attendance will be given when requested by the student.

I DO NOT accept late work. If you have an excused absence, the homework must be emailed/self-taped and emailed the day it is due BEFORE CLASS, NO exceptions. If you are set to perform on a day you are missing due to an excused absence, you must exchange with a peer and it must be preapproved BEFORE the day of performance.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. PARTICIPATION: Attendance alone does not constitute participation. Participation is vital in this class. This is an interactive environment and students must not only attend, but must also actively contribute to each class. Furthermore, the completion of miscellaneous homework assignments/rehearsals in class will also be considered part of your participation grade. There will be quite a few of these short assignments and they are all important in the development of your skills as an actor.

2. READING: Student will read and analyze the corresponding play for every performance project assigned (4 plays total). Student will be responsible for finding the scripts performance projects are from. In conjunction with your performance projects, you must submit a typed script analysis of 2-3 pages on your assigned in class rehearsal day. **No late script analysis will be accepted.** Students will also be reading 3 historical scripts and taking quizzes on them. This encompasses 7 total plays the student will read over the scope of the semester.

3. PRODUCTIONS: View 2 Midwestern plays *Moonlight and Magnolias* and *Merry Wives of Windsor* and write a critique. These will be based on acting critique guidelines provided by the instructor. These must be TYPED, EDITED and 2 pages in length in Standard English with an introduction and conclusion. Failure to see a required play will result in a 100 point penalty. Your ticket is free to both of these shows with your validated Midwestern Student ID.

4. PERFORMANCES: Each student will work with a partner or with a group to perform memorized scenework. The length of the scenes will vary as appropriate. Each of these performances will be rehearsed, workshopped once, and performed. You will be required to score

and block each of these scenes appropriately. These scenes will derive from the dramatic texts of varying historical periods (Greek, Shakespeare, Restoration, Commedia dell'arte, and Comedy of Manners). Specific requirements for these assignments will be given as they become available.

Students will also prepare and present a final Lazzi performance that is based on our study of Commedia dell'arte unit. More details will be given halfway through the semester and will give the student ample time to prepare for the performance.

GRADING: Grading will be out of a total of 1000 points, based on the course requirements outlined above. You could at any time calculate your grade if you are organized and keep all of your assignments (which is a GREAT idea!)

GENERAL NOTES:

Scientific data shows that being fully vaccinated is the most effective way to prevent and slow the spread of COVID-19 and has the greatest probability of avoiding serious illness if infected in all age groups. - When attending theatre performances and class arrive on time, be attentive, quiet and respectful during performances.

Please note that there may be adult themes discussed, addressed, and explored through both script reading and acting scenes in this class. The instructor will be sensitive to all viewpoints, and also allow for free speech and expression. Student safety is the instructor's first priority. Feel free to discuss with her at any time.

Changes in the course syllabus, procedure, assignments, and schedule may be made at the discretion of the instructor. You will be notified of any changes as they occur.

Cell Phones and Other Recording Devices

The use of cell phones and other recording or electronic devices is strictly prohibited during class. The instructor may record performances, from time to time, on a cell phone for legitimate class reasons. This required physical contact may also make concealment of a firearm difficult.
