- Candidates analyze themselves with regard to values, behaviors, and skills related to successful institutional improvement.
- Candidates develop a professional growth plan for self, based on selfassessment.
- Candidates examine the practice, growth and motivation of effective leaders.

- Candidates develop a personal leadership model for their own practice as a leader.
- Candidates learn the foundations of leadership theory and practice appropriate to any organizational setting.
- Candidates reflect on leadership learning.
