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Course Description

The student will learn about vocal anatomy and production through assigned readings, lectures, a midterm exam, and a final reflective paper. The student will develop vocal technique for speaking healthily and communicating effectively on stage through application of techniques and exercises, and the performance of a sonnet, two monologues, and a haiku or poem.

This is a performance-oriented course that focuses on developing the foundational skills in vocal production for the stage. Students will be introduced to exercises in relaxation, alignment, breath support, resonance, articulation, and phonation. Techniques for assessing emotional and psychological truths will be practiced as well as drawing emotional connections to sounds, words, and images. Students will study the International Phonetic Alphabet to understand regional and standard American dialects.

Course Objectives

- Develop correct posture, breath support and vocal placement for healthy vocal technique.
- Work on communicating effectively with clear diction.
- Extensive study of the International Phonetic Alphabet.
- Work with heightened and non-formal language.
- Apply acting technique and character development to create complete performances.
- Expand knowledge of the theatre canon.

Grading

Grades will be comprised of IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) quizzes (25%), a midterm exam (10%), a final reflective paper (10%), three performances (15% each), and additional assignments and class participation (10%). The student is allowed three absences per semester. Three late arrivals equal one absence. Any additional absences will result in a 10% reduction from the final grade.

Additional Assignments

Throughout the semester homework regarding character development will be assigned. Assignments should be uploaded to <u>D2L</u>. Assignments are due by 9:00am and late work will not be accepted. Additional assignments and class participation will count as 10% of your final grade.

Quizzes

Beginning on September 15, 2023, we will have a weekly IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) quiz on Friday. Some of the quizzes will be done outside of class time as IPA translations of your sonnet, monologues, and haikus/poems. Other quizzes will be done in class with text provided by Dr. Edgar. Your best nine out of eleven quizzes will count as 25% of your final grade. Your two quizzes with the lowest scores will not be counted toward your final grade.

Mid-Term Exam

There will be a midterm exam on October 20, 2023 during class time. You will receive a midterm review study guide on October 6, 2023 and we will have a midterm review session in class on October 18, 2023. The midterm will count as 10% of your final grade.

Final Reflective Paper

There will be a reflective final paper due on December 11, 2023 by 8AM through D2L. This paper will reflective on your experiences in Voice & Diction class throughout the semester. You will give examples of techniques and tools you learned that were helpful to your development as an actor. The paper will be two to three pages in length, double-spaced in a 12-point font. Your reflective final paper will count as 10% of your final grade.

MSU Productions and Extra Credit

Attend the Midwestern plays this semester *Hope and Gravity* and *The Marriage Proposal & The Bear.* Your ticket is free to both of these shows with your validated Midwestern Student ID. Seating may be limited for these productions, please ensure you reserve your tickets early. An analysis bonus paper (additional

5% added to your final grade) addressing the vocal production of an actor of your choice will be due one week after the production closes.

Late Work

Late work will not be accepted with the exception of an emergency.

- 2. Daily Vocal Practice and IPA study: Schedule and commit to at least 20 minutes of uninterrupted practice and/or study five days a week. Turn your cell phone off or to airplane mode during this time.
- 3. Reading: Assigned reading is to be completed before the beginning of the week for the material covered during the week.
- 4. Productions: Attend the Midwestern plays this semester *Hope and Gravity* and *The Marriage Proposal & The Bear*. Your ticket is free to both of these shows with

your validated Midwestern Student ID. Seating may be limited for these productions, please ensure you reserve your tickets early.

General Notes

Cell phones need to be turned off or to airplane mode during all classes. Dedicate class time to being present and learning your craft.

Wear comfortable clothes and shoes suitable for movement and floor work during class. Please wear audition dress when you perform your monologues and haiku/poems.

No gum or food. Please always bring water to drink.

Monologues and haiku/poem can be chosen by you, but will need to be email to Dr. Edgar for approval. Content warnings will be given for strong language and/or mature material.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.
