Prerequisite: MUSC 1111 with a minimum grade of C, or placement by instructor.

Course Description: Students will learn and continue to develop piano skills that are required to pass the Piano Proficiency exams. This course is for music majors/minors and may be repeated for credit.

Semester Objectives:

This is the third semester of a four-semester course. Students taking this course will focus on the remaining skills that are necessary to pass the Piano Proficiency exams. Individualized plans of study will be given to students based on his/her/their specific needs. The completion of the Piano Proficiency exams may require additional time and focus that applied lessons can provide.

Course Objectives:

- Continue developing keyboard technique, including hand position, posture, and finger exercises.
- Sight read simple music.
- Finish learning major and minor scales, hands separate.
- Learn basic chord progressions and one-octave arpeggios.
- Perform simple repertoire in a musically and stylistically appropriate manner.
- Harmonize simple songs, like folk songs, with complementary chordal accompaniment.
- Transpose single-line melodies.
- Continue developing ear training and rhythmic reading.

Required Textbook and Materials

- Alfred's Group Piano for Adults, Book 1, second edition by E.L. Lancaster
- Personal headphones or earbuds

Grading for this course is based on attendance, class participation and preparation, and the final exam. For the final exam, students will perform selected piano proficiencies at the end of the semester during exam week.

20% Class participation

60% Assigned competencies and exercises from the textbook and handouts.

20% Passing assigned competencies

Attendance: Students are allowed **two** absences for the semester without a grade reduction. Each absence that exceeds the allotted absences reduces the final grade by one letter grade. Tardies count toward absences. Students who arrive ten minutes late will be marked absent from class. Nonparticipation in class equals one absence for each occurrence. Class participation includes all classroom activities - singing, rhythmic reading, practicing assigned material, and performing individually and as an ensemble. The instructor may drop a student from the course for excessive absences (5 or more)

Cell Phones: Cell phones may be used in this class only in ways that will benefit the students' musical learning, such as a metronome application. Students should not rely on his/her/their cell phone to read music, as the small screen makes music reading more difficult. Cell phones should be set to silent mode and must not distract from the learning environment of the classroom.

Special Needs: If a student needs class accommodation(s) because of a documented disability, has an emergency medical condition that may interfere with class performance, or requires special handling in case the building must be evacuated, he/she is encouraged to contact the office of Disability Support Services in room 168 Clark Student Center and make an appointment with the professor as soon as possible
