Catalog Description:

Interpersonal communication is designed to give students an understanding of communication concepts and practical experience in the communication process. Topics include self-concept, perception, verbal and non-verbal communication, listening, speaking and influencing, conflict management, and mass communication. The impact of gender and culture on communication will be examined. Participation in activities and exercises will provide opportunity to learn how to communicate more effectively in one-on-one, small-group and team situations.

Synopsis:

The study of interpersonal communication is central to mastery of communication processes that constitute relationship building and maintenance. Interpersonal communication or relational communication includes contexts of friendships, intimacy, family, workplace, intercultural situations, and any and all times and spaces where we communicate with another to form and sustain healthy relationships with one another. While interpersonal communication typically refers to the dyad or between 2 people, it is potentially extendable to communicating in small groups and teams. However, this course will place emphasis on dyadic communication interactions and dynamics. Conflict management and resolution is also an important aspect of the study and practice of interpersonal communication.

Classroom instruction will be through lectures based on readings and in-class activities such as informal group discussions. I am available during office hours and beyond if necessary to provide supporting & clarifying instruction as needed. D2L will be the primary source of instructional information dissemination such as lecture slides, supplemental reading material, links to videos, and assignment instructions. Assignment submissions for written assignments will also be through D2L. The Mid-Term exam will have the option of completion and submission through D2L or in

handwritten form. Details will be discussed closer to the mid-term exam date. So please get up to speed with D2L features and functions ASAP.

Regarding Email, I will do my best to regularly check my email and promptly respond; however, I may have other duties and responsibilities that may keep me away from my email. On your end I welcome emails about clarification of assignment requirements, topics, drafts, and personal matters if they interfere with your performance. However, consult the syllabus and D2L postings that may contain the information you are seeking from me. I have many students and assignments--so efficient use of email is in our mutual interest.

The last set of numbers is the ISBN number). I strongly encourage students to acquire the print version as it will be facilitating marking readings as we go along. We will not begin with the book till Week 2 of classes and if you are not able to get hold of it by then, that is fine. I will lecture and post lecture slides on D2L and we will have activities in class.

- 1) Students will gain mastery over theories and concepts of interpersonal communication.
- 2) Students will become proficient in effective and ethical practice of interpersonal communication in different life contexts and situations.

Brief Descriptions of Assignments:

Detailed descriptions for each assignment with rubrics and grading scheme will be made available through D2l well in advance of the deadlines for completion. ***Consult Weekly Course Schedule below for due dates.** If you are required to submit an assignment in class such as an outline it needs to be word processed. The Mid-Term exam can be handwritten. I expect college-quality work for all assignments—therefore it is crucial that you spellcheck and proofread written submissions.

Analysis of Interpersonal Communication in a Film or TV/Cable Show: 10 points

Early on in the semester you will view any film/TV/Cable Show of your choice and analyze it for the relationship dynamics portrayed in it. You will write a 2-3-page paper and include 2 take aways for your own life.

Interview-Based Paper: 20 points

You will interview an individual—a friend/family member/colleague—about their ideas and experiences of interpersonal communication & conflict if relevant. You will write a 3-page paper and include questions you used. The paper format will be like an essay rather than just a summary of Q&A. You will analyze the interview using 2 concepts from the course textbook.

Highlights of Interview: 5 points

You will present 2 highlights from your interview in class.

Interpersonal Communication Journal: 10 points

You will maintain a journal of your observations and interactions with different individuals throughout the semester. At the end of the semester you will submit your journal with 5 entries. Entries can pertain to positive encounters as well as difficult situations. You will maintain the confidentiality of individuals.

Readings-based Discussion (Individual Assignment): 10 points

Every student will be assigned to a section of a chapter from the textbook. On your scheduled day, you will conduct a discussion of the section and involve the class in a Q&A or activity.

Group Presentation on Conflict: 20 points

Students will be assigned to a small group of 4-5 students. You will do a group presentation on interpersonal conflict in a context such as friendships or intimacy or family or workplace. A group outline will be required for this assignment. Classroom time will be allocated for purposes of meeting, planning, and follow-up.

Mid-Term Exam: 20 points

The Mid-Term Exam will be based on the textbook and the readings-based discussion assignment. It will include a Match the Following, Agree/Disagree, and 2 Short Answers.

Final Paper and/or Final Paper & Creative Project: 25 points

You can do a final paper of approximately 5-6 pages based on research or in-depth analysis of an interpersonal communication experience or situation OR a shorter paper of 2-3 pages and a creative project on interpersonal communication such as an uploadable YouTube video or a PowerPoint deck or digital storytelling installation.

Course Policies:

Attendance:

You are allowed 1 unexcused absence during the semester. Otherwise attendance is mandatory as there will be presentations, videos will be screened for assignments, and class lectures may go beyond the readings. Absences beyond the 1 allowed absence will result in a cumulative 2-point deduction. Emergencies and religious holidays as well as attendance at university-permitted events such as sports will be excused—but please notify me via email ahead of time or in the prior class in person if you can. It is your responsibility to make up work missed as soon as possible by coming to my office preferably during office hours or through a peer. And yes, every class is important—so the question “did I miss anything answered” is redundant.

Punctuality:

For Class:

For the reasons specified above, punctuality is required. You are allowed to be late up to 5 mts. after class begins 2 times during the semester. Subsequently each tardy show up will result in a cumulative 2-point deduction. If you are going to be late by 5 mts. beyond the allowed 2 times because of classes in a building across campus communicate that to me as soon as possible when classes start. Should emergencies occur on a class day that necessitates tardy show up, email me as soon as you can.

For Submission of Assignments:

On time submissions of assignments is crucial for grading and to honor students who do so. Since most of your submissions will be through D2L you have considerable latitude in submitting assignments on the required day/date. You are allowed to submit 1 written assignment by the following day without penalty. Subsequent to that I will deduct half the total possible points for late submissions if within the week or by the weekend depending on the required date/day. Assignments submitted the week after the required date/day will result in an F. Mid-Term exam cannot be made up. The Readings-based Discussion assignment and Group Presentation on Conflict assignment cannot be made up. Emergencies need to be communicated to me in a timely manner should they interfere with timely submission of assignments.

Classroom Conduct:

We live in a society and culture where difference either makes the world go around or not! If and when we have discussions and activities, please honor your fellow classmates who may come from a different life path than you. You do not have to agree; however, you respectfully disagree. Disruptive behaviors such as *ad hominem* attacks, silencing your peers, and offensive language such as profanities and threatening non-verbal behaviors will not be tolerated and can result in me requiring you to leave the classroom and reporting such behavior to university authorities. Practice empathy—meaning put yourself in another person’s shoes—in this case your fellow classmates—and ask yourself if such behavior is acceptable to you before engaging in it.

Academic Honesty/ Integrity:

Academic honesty/integrity is a responsibility of all university faculty and students. Faculty members promote academic integrity in multiple ways including instruction on the components of academic honesty, as well as abiding by university policy on penalties for cheating and plagiarism.

Plagiarism:

Academic dishonesty includes both cheating and plagiarism. Cheating includes but is not limited to (1) the falsification or invention of any information, including citations, on an assigned exercise; and/or (3) helping or attempting to help another in an act of cheating or plagiarism. Plagiarism is presenting the words or ideas of another person as if they were your own. Examples of plagiarism are (1) submitting an assignment as if it were one’s own work when, in fact, it is at least partly the work of another; (2) submitting a work that has been purchased or otherwise obtained from an Internet source or another source; and (3) incorporating the words or ideas of an author into one’s paper without giving the author due credit. ***Any writing that is not the work of you or your group members is plagiarism. *Students in this course are expected to adhere to the MSU Student Honor Code.** Do note that D2L comes with a plagiarism detection tool.

By way of advice, do not wait till the last minute as this might increase the chances to cheat or plagiarize. Study. Look to me for guidance on assignments and the mid-term exam.
