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#### Course Description

This course provides students with engaging, comprehensive, and up-to-date coverage of all aspects of the criminal justice system. This course will give students the foundational knowledge that they need to be critical thinkers and active participants within the criminal justice field. ## Quizzes

Quizzes have a specified time limit and will be taken online. Quiz questions may be in Multiple Choice, True-False, Short Answer, Fill-in-the-blank, and/or short essay. Students will take 14 multiple-choice/true-false quizzes, which will be administered online in the D2L system. The due date for each quiz will be listed in the course calendar in D2L. Each quiz covers one chapter and is worth 10 to 15 pts, depending on the amount of material covered in each chapter. **Mind the due dates in the D2L calendar as quizzes will be docked 2-points (20%) for each day they are late.**

## Exams

3 exams will be taken online in D2L. Each exam may consist of multiple choice, true false, short answer, fill-in-the-blank, and/or essay questions.

#### Change of Schedule
