- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, and revision
- Demonstrate proficient use of Standard Written English

#### Final Exam:

The ENGL 0043 final exam is scheduled for **Tuesday**, **May 7**, **from 10:30 AM-12:30 PM** on campus. This exam is not available online.

Dropping the Course: You are enrolled in both ENGL 0043 and 1143 (R sections). You may drop one course and remain enrolled in the other under the following condition: If you are taking a beginning or intermediate math course, you may drop ENGL 0043 beginning March 17, but no sooner in the semester. You may drop ENGL1143 any time until the final drop date, April 24, 2024.

**Grading Policy:** This class does not use the plus/minus grading system. In this class, the following numerical equivalents for final grades are used:

A = 100-90%; B = 89-80%; C = 79-70%; D = 69-60%; F = 59-0

Participation: Participation is 5% of the grade average for the course. You lose 4 participation points each time you miss class, \*have your cell phone or electronic device within reach in the classroom, sleep during class, or refuse to work with your tablemates. You earn participation points by attending a PYCHSS sponsored event (posted on the classroom bulletin board), meet with the instructor for an extracurricular draft conference, and present proof of work on a paper/essay with a writing tutor in TASP. (\*Research proves that a cell phone within reach mentally removes its owner from the classroom.)

Midterm Grades: In order to help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, I provide a Midterm Progress Report through Navigate. I will submit a report for all students, not just those in danger of failing the course. Midterm grades are not reported on the students' transcript; nor are they calculated in the cumulative GPA. They simply give you an idea of where you stand at the midpoint of the semester. Students are not doing satisfactory work at the midway point should make an appointment with me and consider visiting TASP.

Submission Format and Policy: All formal assignments are to be typed and formatted—and outside sources documented—according to MLA style. All formal papers will be uploaded into the D2L Assignment folder.

Grammar Quizzes (GQ) are taken in D2L ENGL 0043. Their due dates are listed on the course home page. The 48-hour rule applies to the quizzes as well.
