# **Music Appreciation**

#### Course Description

Perceptive listening and appreciation of musical elements, forms, and style periods, including composer's lives, individual styles and representative works. Emphasis on western classical music, jazz, and American popular music.

#### <u>Learning Outcomes</u>

- SLO 1: Student demonstrates knowledge of music history, including pieces, composers, and events representative of how music has changed over time.
- SLO 2: Student demonstrates knowledge of musical terminology and how elements of music have been approached differently over time.
- SLO 3: Students will demonstrate the ability to critically analyze and discuss a musical performance.

### Unit Assignments (250 pts, 50 pts per)

Assignments will be posted to D2L. The assignments will be linked to one of the 5 units of the course and provide a new perspective to the musical topic. Assignments are due at midnight of the last day of classes, but I highly suggest you do them along the way.

#### Introduction Paper (50 pts.)

Students will write a 2-page paper in size 12 font (double spaced) about their musical biography. Questions addressed may include how students first remember experiencing music, how they have participated in music throughout their lives, how music has made an impact on their lives, why they enjoy music, and/or a discussion about which song, bands, composers, etc. are their favorite and why, historical events or major life events with musical memories. Papers turned in on time in the proper format will receive full credit.

# Concert Reviews (50 pts [x3] with potential of 50 pts extra credit)

Students will choose three concerts and/or plays to attend and write a review (a fourth may be chosen for extra credit). A calendar of MSU events will be provided, but students are able to review concerts and plays from off campus as well. Reviews must be turned in **with program from the event** no later than one week after the event. The review must be 2–3 pages in length with size 12 font, double spaced. The review must focus on the musical concepts of the performance using terms that have been discussed in class (melody, harmony, rhythm, timbre, context, etc.).

### Unit Quizzes (50 pts [x5])

Unit quizzes will be posted to D2L at the time listed on the syllabus. There are 5 units throughout the class; rhythm, melody, harmony, timbre, and form. Quizzes will be open until the last day of classes at midnight, but I highly suggest you do them along the way.

### Final Exam (150 pts)

The final exam is required. The final exam will be cumulative and cover musical concepts / terminology from the course. A study guide will be provided.

### Final Presentation (150 pts)

The final presentation will consist of preparing a visual presentation and document about two pieces of music of the student's choosing. Students will be graded on their usage of terminology learned in class, critical analysis of the chosen piece, and audio/visual presentation. Presentations will be submitted digitally. A detailed rubric will be provided.
