Plan well and allocate sufficient time to complete the assignments, exam, and research paper in a timely manner. Late submissions are not accepted without severe penalties. No late submissions will be allowed once the assignment is graded. If you scheduled for a deployment, business trip, or have an emergency it is your responsibility to inform me as early as possible. All assignments are available early so you can work ahead.

Course Description and Objectives:

This course is a study of public health policy and management concerns regarding the delivery, quality, and cost of healthcare for individuals and populations. It reviews the structure, process

and outcomes of health services including costs, financing, organization, and accessibility to care.

After completion, students should have a basic understanding of:

- Public health care delivery systems in the United States
- Structure of public health and its impact on health outcomes of individuals and population
- Challenges within the public health care systems (legal, ethical and policy)

Instructional Methods: Instructional strategies for this class will include assigned readings, participation in discussions, written assignments which will include independent research.

Expectations from Students: Responsibility to carefully read the syllabus and other contents of the course relies on students. If there is any doubt about expectation of an assignment or readings or any other matter, it MUST be communicated to the instructor. If a student does NOT reach out to the instructor, it will be assumed by the instructor that the student does NOT have any questions about assignments and the course and knows what is expected of them. No claim of not being able to reach the instructor will be entertained if you have NOT posted your question under 'general discussion' board after attempting to reach out to the instructor via email and failed. You must wait 48 hours for an email response and responses to general discussion post questions.

Course Assignments:

Modules specific to each course week will be posted on D2L. Each module will consist of assigned readings. Some modules may also have an additional homework assignment. Instructions for completing homework assignments will be provided with the assignment. Each module must be completed by the due date specified in the tentative course schedule attached to this syllabus.

Class Discussion: With each module, I will open a discussion window. The participation in these weekly discussions is MANDATORY as they are GRADED. The discussion windows are there so that you can discuss weekly readings with your peers. Students must post comments and treat the discussion posts as discussions in the classroom. This is a great platform to share your experiences and thoughts related to weekly topics. Please note that contribution of instructor to these discussions will be minimal. The idea is that

students learn from helping each other, however, if student(s) poses a question in a weekly discussion post and no other peer can answer it correctly by 11:59 PM Sunday of that week, then the instructor would provide clarification and feedback on Monday. Please note, that weekly discussions forums must only be used to discuss course materials and assignments.

Homework Assignments: Some modules will include a homework assignment. The homework assignment may include multiple choice questions, fill in the blanks, True/False, and short questions or a mixture of all the listed question types. Questions will be based on the materials from the course. In total, there will be THREE homework assignments and they are due on the date listed on the course schedule. Please note that although you are allowed to help each other in solving homework questions, this is not a group assignment, and you are not allowed to work in groups or share solutions to the questions with each other.

Final Exam: There will be NO final exam for this course

TERM PAPER: All students will be required to write 10 pages based on the public health disparities and challenges in overcoming disparities based on the topics we discuss throughout the semester. **You can find the rubric of the paper in the table of contents.** This paper will be due the last week of classes because it will require critical thinking of the knowledge you acquire throughout the semester.

IMPORTANT NOTE: No discussion posts, assignments or papers will be accepted later than the due date. All assignments that are submitted after the due date will receive an automatic zero unless permission was given prior to the due date. Requests to turn work late must be submitted in writing at least ONE week prior to the submission due date. These requests will only be granted under extreme circumstances.

Course Assignment Style Guidelines: For all written assignments and discussion board posts, students are expected to follow APA 7th Ed. formatting guidelines. **If you do not currently have an APA style guide, please purchase or borrow from your classmate.** If you still have difficulty locating the style guide, please contact the instructor.

Grading: Final Grades will be calculated with total points obtained in class. Weighting of assignments for purposes of grading will be as follows:

Students who accumulate below 209 points or 69% of GP will get an 'F'
