# Introduction to Critical Reading and Academic Writing

# Syllabus

The primary objective of the course is to develop students' skills in clear and effective composition and standard usage of the English language. In English 1143, students will read essays, consider context, compose, convincingly support, and polish persuasive, thesis-driven essays.

#### **Course Objectives:**

- Apply knowledge of rhetoric to make decisions about written communication
- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, and revision
- Write thesis-based academic arguments that provide strong support and specific details
- Find, evaluate, and synthesize credible sources in support of a research paper
- Use sources ethically and in contextually appropriate ways and follow a designated style guide
- Demonstrate proficient use of Standard Written English

#### Final Exam:

There is a two-part final exam at the end of the semester: a grammar exam(10%) and a Self-Evaluation Letter(10%).. You will have one hour to complete the grammar exam. The Letter can be composed on your own time, but it needs to uploaded after the completion of the grammar exam.

#### Weekly Assignments:

## Quizzes (20%):

There are ten grammar quizzes and eight reading quizzes. Before taking a quiz, review all the material posted on the quiz topic in D2L or read the associated essay. Quizzes must be taken during the week assigned (i.e., no make-up quizzes). Your final grammar exam will be based on these quizzes, so don't take the quizzes lightly! The week's quizzes are open 5a.m. on Monday until 11p.m. on Sunday of the same week.

## Writing assignments (60%):

Select one of the two available topics on D2L

- (W1) & (W4) a thesis and topic sentences for two supporting paragraphs (10%)
- (W2) & (W5) two body paragraphs based on W1 & W4, respectively (20%)
- (W3) & (W6) complete essays based on W1 and W2, W4 and W5, respectively. (30%)

Late assignment policy: All assignments are due on the dates assigned. No late work will be accepted unless specific arrangements have been made prior to the due date. Students falling two assignments behind are subject to administrative withdrawal from the course by the instructor.

Acceptable submission format and process: All formal writing assignments submitted for grading must conform to the *Writing and Formatting Your Essay* and *Essay Grading Guidelines* documents posted to D2L. Assignments are to be submitted to the Dropbox folders in the course D2L website.
