Introduction:

Most American students and citizens learn about the Viet Nam War through the U.S. perspective but this class will do the opposite. Though the class will discuss the American goals and home front, the focus will be on what North Viet Nam and South Viet Nam wanted and how each sought to achieve their objectives. You will learn about how the war impacted the lives of millions of Vietnamese, both combatant and civilian. The names and cities will be foreign – will not be different from how Americans thought in the 1960s, but with a little time and effort, you will learn about a war that divided the United States and changed how the military fought wars. More importantly, this course might challenge your views on the Viet Nam War and what you learned from the internet, the media, politicians, and family members.

Objectives:

- 1. This is not your traditional Viet Nam War class. You will learn the war from the perspective of the "other," the Vietnamese, both north and south.
- 2. Learn to read 3 memoirs and 1 academic book and analyze their arguments and perspectives.
- 3. Learn to take readings and formulate an argumentative essay.
- 4. Learn to listen and take notes.

5. Learn to work in groups through war scenario game.

MSU Attendance Policy

The following constitutes plagiarism: "the use, deliberate or not, of any outside source without proper acknowledgment. While the work of others often constitutes a necessary resource for academic research, such work must be properly used and credited to the original author. This principle applies to professional scholars as well as to students. All work that students submit or present as part of course assignments or requirements must be their own original work. When students use the specific thoughts, ideas, writings, or expressions of others, they must accompany each instance of use with some form of attribution to the source. Direct quotes from any source (including the Internet) must be placed in quotation marks...and be accompanied by an appropriate citation." Plagiarism will result in the offender receiving zero in the course.

LAST SEMESTER SEVERAL ONLINE STUDENTS WERE CAUGHT FOR PLAGIARISM AND CHEATING ON THE EXAM – zero tolerance.

Refund and Repayment Policy
