#### Homework

Homework represents 400 points (40%) of your final grade and there are two categories of assignments each worth 200 points (20%).

- Lecture responses: four lecture responses spread out over the semester each worth fifty points.
- Chapter summary: thirteen chapter summaries each worth twenty poins and I will drop the lowest three scores. While I recommend you read a chapter a week, I will check your summaries four times a semester.

#### Exams

You will have two exams over the course of the semester, a midterm exam and a final exam. Both will be online and both will be worth 100 points each. You will have at least twenty-four hours to complete the exam and you will **not** be required to have a lockdown browser.

## **Projects Required**

There is a big project where you will write your own global history paper and it is worth 400 points (40% of your grade). Rather than have one big deadline, I split this project into five smaller, more maneagable deadlines).

- Global History Proposal (50 points)
- Annotated Bibliography (50 points)
- Outline (50 points)
- Rough Draft (150 points)
- Final Draft (100 points)

#### **Extra Credit**

There may be opportunities for extra credit over the semester but I do not offer individual extra credit.

#### **Late Work**

While I am generally happy to give extensions for late work, you should let me know you need an extension as soon as you can.

## Smoking/Tobacco Policy

Alcohol and Drug Policy

To comply with the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989 and subsequent amendments, students and employees of Midwestern State are informed that strictly enforced policies are in place which prohibit the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of any illicit drugs, including alcohol, on university property or as part of any university-sponsored activity. ## Campus Carry

Effective August 1, 2016, the Campus Carry law (Senate Bill 11) allows those licensed individuals to carry a concealed handgun in buildings on public university campuses, except in locations the University establishes as prohibited. The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License-to-carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
