Use of AI (ChatGPT, Grammarly, etc.) is forbidden. I want to know what you think, not what a machine says. Because AI-generated work is clearly plagiarized, an AI submission will earn a zero for that assignment.

Midterm Grades

Your Midterm grade is not reported on your transcript, nor is it calculated in your cumulative GPA. It simply gives you an idea of where you stand at the midpoint of the semester. The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License to Carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
