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# **Course Description**

This course is designed to explore the rules of pronunciation of the German and French languages. It will utilize the International Phonetic Alphabet to explore these languages as they apply to singing. Students are expected to apply this knowledge to the reading, reciting, and singing of German and French song repertoire.

# **Song Projects**

This course will include 2 song projects: one German and one French. Students may consult their applied voice instructors for repertoire selection. Each project will consist of a prepared phonetic transcription and English translation as well as an in class performance.

#### **Exams**

This course will have 4 exams, including the final exam. Each exam will be consist of a written portion and an oral portion.

## **Final Exam**

The final exam will be formatted similarly to the previous 3 exams, consisting of a written portion and an oral reading of both German and French text. An IPA transcription will be provided for the oral portion. The final exam will be worth 10% of the final grade for this course. The final exam is scheduled for Thursday December 12, 2024 at 10:30am.

## Make-up Work/Tests

Any assignments missed due to absence may be turned in via email by the original due date. Late assignments may result in a grade deduction if not accompanied by proper documentation of illness or extenuating circumstances. Exams and performances may be made up if the student reports the absence via email before the time of class meeting.

#### **Attendance**

Students are expected to attend class regularly. Any absences should be communicated with the instructor in a timely manner. Students are allowed one unexcused absence. Any further unexcused absences may result in a 5% deduction from your final grade.

## **Change of Schedule**

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

# **Refund and Repayment Policy**

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees, and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester. # Campus Carry

Effective August 1, 2016, the Campus Carry law (Senate Bill 11) allows those licensed individuals to carry a concealed handgun in buildings on public university campuses, except in locations the University establishes as prohibited. The new Constitutional Carry law does not change this process. Concealed carry still requires a License-to-carry permit, and openly carrying handguns is not allowed on college campuses.
