Course Description:

An introduction to ceramic materials and techniques of hand building, decorating, glazing, loading and firing of kilns.

Objectives:

1. Demonstrate a basic understanding of equipment safety and possible health hazards associated with ceramics, while maintaining a clean working environment
2. Describe, recognize, and utilize ceramic tools
3. Demonstrate rudimentary knowledge of kiln firings to include oxidation and reduction methods
4. Demonstrate basic skill with select hand building techniques
5. Demonstrate the procedure for loading kilns: glaze and bisque
6. Demonstrate basic wheel techniques
7. Demonstrate basic glazing and surface decorating methods

Textbook: *The Craft and Art of Clay* (Fourth Edition), by Susan Peterson (this book is a great book for ceramics majors. If you are not a major, you do not need to buy this book. You may use a book in the reference section of the library or I have a copy in my office.

Other Expenses:

1. Respirator: It is recommended that you buy a respirator. This is not mandatory. These are available at Lowes, Home Depot, or Granger – make sure it is good for dust (they usually have a magenta (pink) color on the filter and are generally labeled P100 filters): Approximately \$30. A N95 dust mask is the other option. **You must have an N95 dust mask OR respirator for this class!!**
2. Assorted ceramic tools: Approximately \$75 (See below). There is no charge for clay or glaze!!

Building Use Hours:

1. Art building access will be discussed the first day of class
2. The use of this and all art studios is considered a privilege, if this is abused, it will be revoked.
3. The studio door code is **245**. Please do not share it with anyone outside this class.

Locker:

Choose a locker that has nothing in it and put your lock on it. Put your name on the locker sign-up list.

Attendance Policy:

Students enrolled in the Juanita and Ralph Harvey School of Visual Arts must comply with the following department-wide Attendance and Lateness Policy:

- **If you are sick . . . Please don't come to class!! We can Zoom/Facetime you in if appropriate**
- Students arriving after class begins will be considered late. Students arriving 10 minutes after class begins will be counted absent.
- THREE late arrivals count as an absence.
- Students may be absent from class THREE times without penalty and without providing any documentation regarding the absence.
- If students incur a FOURTH absence, their final course evaluation will be reduced by a full letter grade.
- If students are absent or late FIVE times, whatever the reason, they will receive a FAILING GRADE, be dropped from the class roll, and be asked to stop attending class.
- Example: after your 4th absence, a 90% (A) will become an 80% (B)
- Example: after your 4th absence and 3rd tardy, an 80% will become an F and you will be dropped
- *Faculty members have the discretion to make exceptions to this policy based on individual circumstances.*
- **When you are absent, it is YOUR responsibility to contact class members and learn what you missed.**

Homework:

You will have homework in this class . . . except you will be doing most of it in the studio. You should spend a minimum of 6 hours in the studio outside class time to be successful. Most will spend more. The more time you spend in the studio the more successful you will be. If you make more . . . You will learn more!

If you can make the time spent outside of class part of your social culture, this class will be a more memorable experience.

Clay and Glaze Making Fridays

This is a class where we have to work together. Students will be expected to sign up and attend several 3-hour clay making sessions with myself, our resident, or a Studio Assistant. Making glaze is a possibility.

Grading Policy:

Each assignment should be evaluated and graded as it is completed. It is your responsibility to make sure I know your work is ready to be graded.

Since ceramic work has two stages of completion, you will be graded on turning your completed green or leather hard work in on time, and you will be graded on your glazed work at the end of the semester. I will be grading your work with rubrics designed for specific assignments.

As art is subjective, I will be grading your assignments with some of the following criteria (depending on the assignment). Again . . . **It is your responsibility to show me each assignment as it is completed:**

1. Is it **innovative/experimental/ambitious/creative/original** . . . **were you self-motivated?**
2. Does it accomplish the assignment?
3. Does it **communicate** your intention/content?
4. Is it aesthetically pleasing . . . and designed well?
5. Did you use excellent Craftpersonship?
6. Did you give adequate attention to detail(s)?
7. Is there evidence of technical proficiency?
8. Is there growth in your work? Is there evidence of progression in your work?
9. Did you challenge yourself?
10. Did you consider historical ceramic imagery and reference images in your work?
11. Is there a sketchbook entry with a written journal, and glaze application for each piece?

Your final grade will be determined by a formula similar to the one below:

Points earned divided by points possible (approximately 800 pts)

Assignments	500 points
Critique (4 critiques minimum)	100 points
Sketchbooks	100 points
Participation (clean-up, helping out, tools)	25 points
Wood Fire Participation	25 points (if we have a wood firing)
Quizzes	50points

Journal/Sketchbook:

You will be required to keep a journal/sketchbook/notebook for this class. It should just contain your ceramics notes, sketches, reference images, glaze references, hours worked, and **journal entries**. You will be asked to make preliminary sketches for all assignments (except your cylinders!). You will be asked to provide reference imagery for all assignments (except your cylinders!). You will be asked to write down how you glaze every piece made this semester (including your cylinders!). In addition, you will be responsible for a minimum of 30 journal entries which will include:

- written critiques
- notes from lectures
- ideas for projects
- ceramic artists referenced in class
- Empty Bowl entries and reflections

Communication:

If you have a question/problem with the material or a technique, please see me as soon as possible. If you wait until the last week of the semester, I might not be able to help you.

Accommodation:

Any student who feels she/he may need an accommodation based on the impact of a disability should contact me privately to discuss your specific needs. Studio Etiquette:

It is everyone's responsibility to help keep the studio clean. Do not leave without making sure all materials, tools, and artwork are properly stored. Your grade will be lowered if you do not clean up after yourself.

- The last 12.498 minutes of class is devoted to cleaning up, with **everyone** assisting.
- The floors need to be mopped **every** class period and **every** time you throw on the wheel
- There will be one mandatory all studio clean-up in the middle of the semester and the final clean-up on **Thursday, December 5 at 9:30 AM . . . this is the final cleanup, if you miss the cleanup, you will lose one letter grade from your final grade!**
- During the semester, everyone will be asked to help maintain the studio
- **Please turn all cell phones to silent while in the ceramic studio . . . this includes texting ******
- **Music:** Please respect everyone in the studio when playing your music on the Ion Speaker. If someone asks you to turn it down or change the music, please do so.

If you are sick . . . stay home. But try to Zoom/Facetime the class. You have to do this in a timely manner. Do not ask to Zoom unless you give me at least 30 minutes notice.

Decorum and Academic Dishonesty:

3. **Always** wear a respirator and rubber gloves when working with any toxic materials.
4. **Always** wear a respirator when sanding ceramic material and spraying glaze.
5. **Always** sand ceramic material outside
6. A list of all materials used in this studio is available in the yellow folder next to the front door.
7. TAKING THIS COURSE IN THE ART DEPARTMENT AT MSU MEANS THAT YOU ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY to use all equipment, tools, and materials related to the course in a safe and responsible manner. If you have any health-related problems that would be adversely affected by taking the course, you should consult with me at the end of the first day of the class.
8. Please tell me about any accidents, no matter how small.

Return and Retention of Student Work

If work or tools are left in the studio longer than (1) one week after the end of the semester, the department has the right to dispose of or use the unclaimed work for any purpose.

Departmental Policy for Gallery Openings

- Students enrolled in studio or art history courses must attend every gallery opening.

 2. The paper should emphasize the student’s reaction to the work.
 3. The paper must be formatted in Times New Roman, 12pt font, and be double-spaced.
 4. The paper must consist of 500 words.
 5. The paper must be submitted to the art office **one week** after the exhibition opening.
 6. If the exhibition extends past the final class day of the semester, the paper will be due one week before the final class day of the semester.

- If a student does not attend the show nor submit a paper, their final grade will be dropped 3.3% per gallery opening.
- If a student misses all of the gallery openings and does not write a paper for each required exhibition, the student's final grade will be dropped by 10%.
