Course Description

The primary goal of Senior Capstone is to create a conceptual and technically proficient body of work that culminates in a Capstone/Senior Exhibition. This course will facilitate this goal by building on previous coursework, life experiences, historical influence and preceding art practices. The secondary but equally important goal is to prepare students/artists for a lifelong art practice working as an artist and/or art educator, while emphasizing professional standards and practices. This course is required for both BFA and BFA with Teacher Certification degree programs.

Course Objectives -

- Prepare the student to enter the workforce as an art professional
- Support the student in the production and exhibition of a cohesive body of work
- The production of a résumé
- The production of an artist biography
- The production of an artist statement
- The production of documents related to the promotion of an exhibition, including the above, a postcard and a digital business card
- The Design of a website describing, documenting, and promoting their work
- The production of an exhibition with a cohesive and thoughtful body of work
- The presentation of a PowerPoint artist presentation to the art faculty and public
- Students will apply to a minimum of one juried art exhibition
- The design and production of branding materials/networking materials/press release
