Course Description

The student will learn about vocal anatomy and healthy vocal production. The student will develop vocal technique for singing and learn to communicate effectively on stage through the application of exercises, and the performance of songs and/or scenes. Additionally, this course will be an exploration of the art of acting the song, particularly as it relates to musical theatre. Students will watch a musical and write an assessment paper as well as write a final reflective paper.

Course Objectives

- Develop healthy vocal technique.
- Work on communicating effectively with clear diction.
- Apply acting technique and character development to create complete performances.
- Expand knowledge of the musical theatre canon.
- Deepen knowledge of music theory and how music reflects characterization.

- One version of *Singer's Musical Theatre Anthology* depending on your voice type.
- Yoga mat or towel for floor work.

Grading

The student's grade will be 20% class participation, 20% performance of 1st song, 20% performance of 2nd song, 20% performance of a scene, 10% assessment paper of a musical, and 10% final reflective paper.

The student is allowed three absences per semester. Late arrivals or missing (leaving) class time for more than ten minutes will be considered a tardy. Three tardies will equal one absence. Any additional absences will result in a 10% reduction from the final grade.

Class Participation

The class will be structured as private 25-minute lessons on Monday and Wednesday, and a group studio class on Friday. Come prepared to sing and receive instruction on improving your vocal technique as well as musicianship and characterization.

Assignments and Quizzes

Throughout the semester, homework and quizzes regarding vocal anatomy, vocal technique, vocal health, and the singer's artistic identity will be assigned. Assignments should be uploaded into D2L. Assignments are due by 10AM and late work will not be accepted. Additional assignments are part of your class participation grade.

Performances

There will be two song performances and a scenes performance.

Students will be able to audition for a musical theatre cabaret on May 2, 2025 during class time. The musical theatre cabaret will be May 9, 2025 at 5:30PM. A student may audition to perform in one scene and one solo.

Musical Assessment Paper

The student will watch a musical that they have never seen before and write a 2–3-page paper discussing what they learned about vocal technique, musical theatre history, or acting. The paper will be two to three pages in length, double-spaced in a 12-point font. Your musical assessment paper will count as 10% of your final grade.

Final Reflective Paper

There will be a reflective final paper due on May 14, 2025 by 12:30PM as an upload to D2L. This paper will reflect on your experiences and improvement in Singing for the Actor class throughout the semester. You will give examples of techniques and tools you learned that were helpful to your development as a singer. The paper will be two to three pages in length,

double-spaced in a 12-point font. Your reflective final paper will count as 10% of your final grade.

MSU Productions and Extra Credit

Attend the Midwestern plays this semester 1984 and Godspell. Your ticket is free to both of these shows with your validated Midwestern Student ID. An analysis of vocal production paper covering the performance of one of the actors (additional 5% added to your final grade) can be submitted one week after the production closes.

Late Work

Late work will not be accepted with the exception of an emergency.

Make Up Work/Tests

No make-up work or tests will be accepted with the exception of an emergency.

Desire-to-Learn (D2L)

Extensive use of the MSU D2L program is a part of this course. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, and general course information. Attendance

Students are expected to attend all meetings of the classes in which they are enrolled. A student with excessive absences may be dropped from a course by Dr. Edgar. The student is allowed three absences per semester. Three late arrivals and/or three incidents of leaving class for more than ten minutes equal one absence. Any additional absences will result in a 10% reduction from the final grade.

Instructor Class Policies

- 1. Participation: Daily participation in class activities and discussions. Always be warmed-up physically and vocally, and prepared to sing.
- 2. Daily Vocal Practice: Schedule and commit to at least 30 minutes of uninterrupted vocal practice six days a week. Turn your cell phone off or to airplane mode during this time.
- 3. Reading: Assigned reading is to be completed before the beginning of the week for the material covered during the week.
- 4. Writing: There will be two papers as well as two opportunities to write a bonus paper.

General Notes

Cell phones need to be turned to airplane mode during all classes and private sessions. Please record when you are singing in class or in a private session, so you can listen back for improvement.

Wear comfortable clothes and shoes suitable for movement and floor work during class and private sessions. Please wear audition dress when you perform your song.

No gum or food. Please always bring water to drink.

Songs and scenes will be selected and assigned by Dr. Edgar. These assignments are made thoughtfully to showcase a particular strength, focus on a particular area for improvement, and ensure that you are developing a variety of repertoire. Song and scene suggestions can be made by the student, but may not be best for development. I ask you to trust me as your devoted teacher and set up a meeting if you have concerns about your song assignment.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy
