Course Description

Continued exploration of the techniques and aesthetics of directing. Practice in translating analysis into performance and production through the direction and/or collaboration of a one act play. Executing of the role of the director, or another leadership role, in production conception, design, casting, rehearsing, and staging.

Students will study one act plays. The students will select a one act play, perform script analysis and research, recruit actors, cast and rehearse scenes, and collaborate with designers. This work will cumulate in one of two performances of one-act plays.

Basic principles of Intimacy Choreography will be incorporated and directors will be expected to create brave spaces for their actors. Additionally, students will be assigned technical and design positions for their classmates as suits their skill sets and area(s) of study. Students will work in groups to create lesson plans for local teachers as promotion for next season's plays and musicals.

Course Objectives

- Read plays analytically and expand knowledge of the canon.
- Understand the role of the director in a production process.
- Through extensive research and imagination, create the "world of the play" with classmates.

- Communicate effectively, efficiently and kindly with actors and designers.
- Apply the basic principles of Intimacy Choreography.
- Create lesson plans for local teachers to promote next season's plays and musicals.

Grading

Grades will be comprised of the student's preparation and performance as director, designer, technician and/or actor in a production of two performances of one act plays (15% each for a total of 30%), presentations of their work in production meetings in the assigned role(s) (15% each for a total of 30%), a group project that creates lesson plans for local teachers (20%), and two reflective papers two to three pages long double spaced in a 12-point font on the performances (10% each for a total of 20%).

The student is allowed three absences per semester. Late arrivals or missing (leaving) class time for more than ten minutes will be considered a tardy. Three tardies will equal one absence. Any additional absences will result in a 10% reduction from the final grade.

90% or above=A, 80% or above =B, 70% or above=C, 60% or above=D and 59% or below=F.

Producing the Plays

Student directors, designers, technicians, and actors will be expected to read their one act plays, and do extensive research. Research areas include but are not limited to the playwright, the time period when the play is set and the time period when the play was written, the style of the play, historical productions of the play, and technical elements including set, props, lights and costumes. Student directors and designers will present their research through a PowerPoint presentation or renderings in Production Meetings. Each scene will be graded on the student's preparation and the successful performance of the plays. Each performance will count as 15% of your final grade.

Reflective Papers

After the plays' performance, the student director, designer and/or technician will write a self-evaluating reflective paper on the successful and less successful aspects of the rehearsal process and performance. This is an opportunity to reflect on one's work and make improvements in the next directing project. There will be two reflective papers and each will count as 10% of your final grade. Papers can be uploaded into <u>D2L</u>.

Group Project; Lessons Plans

Students will work in groups to create lesson plans for local teachers to be distributed by the Publicity Office regarding next season's plays and musicals. These lesson plans will include information about the playwright, the time period when the play is set and the time period when the play was written, the style of the play, historical productions of the play, and technical elements including set, props, lights and costumes as well as an optional

test over the play and provided information. This group project will count towards 20% of your final grade. Scripts will be available through <u>D2L</u>.

MSU Productions and Extra Credit

Attend both Midwestern plays this semester 1984. and Godspell. Your ticket is free to both of these shows with your validated Midwestern Student ID. An analysis bonus paper (additional 5% added to your final grade) can be submitted one week after the production closes.

Late Work

Late work will not be accepted with the exception of an emergency.

Make Up Work

No make-up work or tests will be accepted with the exception of an emergency.

Change of Schedule
