HSAD 5013

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Course Overview:

An overview of the U.S. health care system that explores a wide variety of topics including the ACA, U.S. demographics, the U.S. health care (non) system, the importance of DRG and ICD-10 coding. During this overview the course also focuses on the honing skills needed by students to be successful in the field as well as those needed to be successful academically.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe the major federal, state and local health care institutions that impact on health care delivery in the U.S.
- Understand the dynamic tensions that may exist between federal, state and local health care governments.
- Describe the contemporary environment within which health care delivery takes place in the U.S.
- Identify some of the basic problems in the distribution and financing of health services in the U.S.
- Embark on an understanding of the role of an administrator in health care.
- Demonstrate competence in critical writing skills and analysis.
- Summarize basic research methods using correct grammar and the APA format.

Discussion Boards:

In the required discussion boards, there are three topics provided: Each student is required to post **one** meaningful response to the question, as well as **two** responses to other students for **each topic**. Due dates are found in the course schedule. This is an

open discussion; but you must keep in mind proper discussion board etiquette. It is also the students' responsibility to facilitate discussion within their own post if classmates have questions or comments. If students wait until the deadline to complete original posts, or fail to facilitate discussion, it is not fair to peers and defeats the purpose of the discussion. Failing to adhere to these policies will result in a loss of credit for the discussion board assignment. Discussion boards are worth 40% of your total grade. Failure to complete discussion boards can negatively affect your grade.

Written Assignments:

Writing assignments in this course will be expected to follow 7th ed. APA formatting, with attention to proper grammar, and spelling. See the individual rubric and assignment specifics in D2L. Writing assignments are worth 40% of your total grade, please review the rubric for every assignment to ensure you are meeting the expectations. The final paper is worth 20% of your overall grade. Therefore, it is important that students review all feedback on previous writing assignment throughout the course to prevent "repeat errors".

Unit 1 – Introduction to Health Services Administration

The primary focus of this unit is to review the duties associated with role of a health services administrator, the roles and requirements of the different healthcare providers within the U.S. healthcare system, and the laws or legislation that govern how care is provided.

Reading assignments will refer to required materials derived from the textbook and/or any other provided materials. It is the student's responsibility to read the required information. The reading assignments for this module are Chapters 1-3 of the *Introduction to Health Services Administration* textbook.

In the Unit 1 Writing Assignment, the student will find the details of the associated writing assignment. Writing assignments in this course will be expected to follow 7th ed. APA formatting, with attention to proper grammar, and spelling. See the individual rubric and assignment specifics in D2L. Upload the completed writing assignment to the dropbox by the assignment due date. Due dates are available in the course calendar.

Finally, there is also a discussion board that must be completed. Remember, each student is required to post **one** meaningful response to the question, as well as **two** responses to other students for **each topic**. This is an open discussion, but you must keep in mind proper discussion board etiquette. Original posts are due Wednesday of each week, with replies due by Sunday.

Unit 2 – Administrative Management

In the Unit 2 Writing Assignment, the student will find the details of the associated writing assignment. Writing assignments in this course will be expected to follow 7th ed. APA formatting, with attention to proper grammar, and spelling. See the individual rubric and assignment specifics in D2L. Upload the completed writing assignment to the dropbox by the assignment due date. Due dates are available in the course calendar.

Finally, there is also a discussion board that must be completed. Remember, each student is required to post **one** meaningful response to the question, as well as **two** responses to other students for **each topic**. In the Unit 3 Writing Assignment, the student will find the details of the associated writing assignment. Writing assignments in this course will be expected to follow 7th ed. APA formatting, with attention to proper grammar, and spelling. See the individual rubric and assignment specifics in D2L. Upload the completed writing assignment to the dropbox by the assignment due date. Due dates are available in the course calendar.

Finally, there is a discussion board that must be completed. Remember, each student is required to post **one** meaningful response to the question, as well as **two** responses to other students for **each topic**. APA formatting, with attention to proper grammar, and spelling. See the individual rubric and assignment specifics in D2L. Upload the completed writing assignment to the dropbox by the assignment due date. Due dates are available in the course calendar.

Finally, there is a discussion board that must be completed. Remember, each student is required to post **one** meaningful response to the question, as well as **two** responses to other students for **each topic**. This is an open discussion, but you must keep in mind proper discussion board etiquette. Original posts are due Wednesday of each week, with replies due by Sunday.

Unit 5 - Final Paper

Students should begin by reading the instructions for the final paper. This assignment should be very straight forward.
