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Course Description

Course Identification

This capstone course introduces students to the art and practice of documentary filmmaking, bringing together the knowledge and skills they've developed throughout their Mass Communication studies at MSU Texas.

Productions

Working in teams, students will produce a 12–15 minute short-form documentary. The project will draw on every stage of the process—preproduction research, proposal writing, interviews, lighting, observational shooting, and editing—culminating in a complete, well-researched, and technically proficient narrative.

In addition to production, student teams will take on the responsibilities of outreach and promotion, including public engagement and media interviews.

- Students will produce an original documentary between 12 and 15 minutes in length.
- Students will examine ethical, legal, organizational and other aspects of the mass communication world.
- Students will improve their written, oral and visual communication skills.

Academic Misconduct Policy & Procedures

Academic Dishonesty: Cheating, collusion, and plagiarism (the act of using source material of other persons, either published or unpublished, without following the accepted techniques of crediting, or the submission for credit of work not the individual's to whom credit is given). Additional guidelines on procedures in these matters may be found in the Office of Student Conduct.

Plagiarism: Academic dishonesty includes both cheating and plagiarism. Cheating includes but is not limited to (1) using or attempting to use unauthorized materials to aid in achieving a better grade on a component of a class; (2) the falsification or invention of any information, including citations, on an assigned exercise; and/or (3) helping or attempting to help another in an act of cheating or plagiarism. Plagiarism is presenting the words or ideas of another person as if they were your own. Examples of plagiarism are (1) submitting an assignment as if it were one's own work when, in fact, it is at least partly the work of another; (2) submitting a work that has been purchased or otherwise obtained from an Internet source or another source; and (3) incorporating the words or ideas of an author into one's paper without giving the author due credit. Any writing that is not the work of you or your group members is plagiarism. Students in this course are expected to adhere to the MSU Student Honor Code.

AI Statement: Welcome to the wide world of new programs that can "do your writing for you". Why did I put that into quotes? Because some of the writing is problematic and a lot of it is downright bland. Having said that, I accept that this is yet another way to get around doing your own work, if that is the choice being made. But maybe it can be used for good, and that is where we are right now. In the "what if" and "how to" zone. We might have assignments that use or integrate AI writing this semester. There might be other places where it simply

isn't appropriate for the assignment. Perhaps AI can be a helpful tool, and that is part of what we can explore this semester. With that in mind, if you are found to have used AI writing programs in a place where they are not explicitly allowed on an assignment, you will receive a '0' grade, be reported for academic dishonesty, and will not have the chance to re-do or replace that assignment. I'd prefer that we see this as a chance to learn and adapt rather than just another way to cheat, so we'll approach it from that angle and see where we end up. I look forward to entering this newish universe with you.

Desire-to-Learn (D2L)

Extensive use of the MSU D2L program is a part of this course. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, and general course information. Attendance is a graded component because perfect attendance is expected and required. Projects of this scale demand full commitment, and I will go to great lengths to ensure everyone is present (see note above regarding quizzes). If you must miss a class or deadline, you are required to contact me **in advance**. Doing so does not automatically excuse the absence, but it is far preferable to explaining afterward. Failure to contact me before the next class will make excusing the absence unlikely.

Excused absences do not include work conflicts, non-emergency medical or dental appointments, hangovers, intramural games, visitors, fixing roommates' computers, fraternity/sorority events, relationship issues, or studying for other classes. Please see the Missed Assignments Policy for further detail.

Absences for religious holidays or university-sponsored events (such as field trips or athletics) must be arranged with me as early as possible. For university events, you are required to submit an official form and complete all assigned work by the original due date.

As some of my colleagues will say: in the real world, you can't do your job if you don't show up. Employers don't tolerate weak excuses, and employees who rely on them often find themselves unemployed. The same principle applies here. If you cannot make attendance a priority, I encourage you to drop now so another student who is committed can take your place.

Withheld Grades/Semester Grades Policy: Ordinarily, at the discretion of the instructor of record and with the approval of the academic chair/director, a grade of WH will be assigned only if the student cannot complete the course work because of unavoidable circumstances. Students must complete the work within one calendar year from the end of the semester in which they receive a WH, or the grade automatically becomes an F. If students register for the same course in future terms the WH will automatically become an F and will be counted as a repeated course for the purpose of computing the grade point average.

Course Conduct: Classroom behavior should not interfere with the instructor's ability to conduct the class or the ability of other students to learn from the instructional program. Unacceptable or disruptive behavior will not be tolerated. Students who disrupt the learning environment may be asked to leave class and may be subject to judicial, academic or other penalties. This prohibition applies to all instructional forums, including electronic, classroom, labs, discussion groups, field trips, etc. The instructor shall have full discretion over what behavior is appropriate/inappropriate in the classroom.

Cell Phones and Other Recording Devices

The use of cell phones and other recording or electronic devices is strictly prohibited during class. The instructor may direct, from time to time, on the possible use of cell phones for legitimate class reasons. Recording the class is prohibited, unless it is part of a reasonable accommodation under ADA, or by obtaining written consent by the instructor.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester. HOWEVER, if the student received financial aid (federal/state/institutional grants, loans and/or scholarships), all or a portion of the refund may be returned to the financial aid programs.
