Midterm Grades

In order to help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, the instructor for this class will provide a Midterm Progress Report through each student's WebWorld account. **[only at-risk students will be reported]**. Midterm grades will not be reported on the student's transcript, nor will they be calculated in the cumulative GPA. They simply give students an idea of where they stand at the midpoint of the semester. Students earning below a C at the midway point should [schedule a meeting with the professor].

Change of Schedule
