Course Description

Students will learn the foundations for teaching voice, starting with an introduction to human physiology focused on the vocal mechanism and followed by a study of acoustics as related to singing. Students will gain the necessary skills and knowledge for training singers of all ages through individual and group instruction. Voice class students will learn 1-3 songs and a variety of vocal exercises in this course.

Course Objectives and Student Learning Outcomes

The student will learn basic singing techniques, diction, and vocal repertoire. These will be presented in a practical manner and will help the student in singing as a soloist or as a group performer.

Handouts, Sheet Music and Exercises provided by the instructor. *Adventures in Singing* by Ware will be the primary reference.
