Course Description: The purpose of the course is to allow the advanced theatre student to do directed research and/or creative projects related to theatre productions or to extend their knowledge/training in specific areas. Possibilities include, but are not limited to, the scholarly analysis of theatre productions produced by either the MSU Theatre or by off-campus amateur or professional companies, or major performance/design responsibilities for MSU Theatre productions. The student must have the consent of the Chair of the Theatre Department to enroll in the course, which may be repeated once for elective credit.

3. a firm knowledge of shop safety and theatre construction
 - a. Theoretical/conceptual knowledge and application
 - b. Employability
 - c. Safety knowledge and practice
 - d. Professionalism

Course Requirements

1. A theatre faculty member must agree to supervise the student's work.
2. A specific topic or project must be defined in consultation with the faculty member.

Cell Phones and Other Recording Devices

Cell phones must be...

1. Silenced
2. Put away completely out of sight
3. Not looked at until after class

If at any point your cell phone is NOT put away and silenced, you will be asked to leave for the remainder of the day. This will result in an absence.

The use of cell phones and other recording or electronic devices is strictly prohibited during class. The instructor may direct, from time to time, on the possible use of cell phones for legitimate class reasons. Recording the class is prohibited, unless it is part of a reasonable accommodation under ADA, or by obtaining written consent by the instructor.

Computer and Tablet Usage

Often electronic devices provide distraction during class. The use of electronic devices during class is prohibited unless specifically mentioned otherwise. Note taking should be accomplished with a writing utensil and paper. Always be prepared with the proper note taking materials when in class.

Be aware that we may be getting dirty during class or participating in activities that require movement. Dress appropriately. Be aware of all Shop Safety requirements.

Attendance

Attendance is mandatory. You are responsible for any information that you miss due to absenteeism. Attendance is taken at the beginning of class. Excessive lateness may count as an absence and will be determined by the instructor. Excessive absenteeism during the course can also weigh negatively on attendance. This would include leaving class early, being asked to leave for any reason, or prolonged absence during the class time.

Unavoidable absence – Jury duty, death in the family, etc. You must send notification by email to the instructor explaining the situation prior to missing the class. Be sure to include your name, class period (day/time) and your situation.

Late assignments will not be accepted. Quizzes missed due to absenteeism cannot be made up.

Feeling sick and opting not to attend class will be a normal absence. For that absence to be excused, an official doctor's note must be submitted within 3 days of the absence. Doctor's notes cannot retroactively be utilized beyond 3 days.

Conduct Statement

Classroom behavior that interferes with either the instructor's ability to conduct the class or the ability of other students to benefit from the instruction will result in the instructor's removing the disruptive student(s) from the class.
