Goals:

- 1. Become acquainted with expected psychological and emotional developmental milestones of the human life span.
 - a. Have realistic expectations of small children, adolescents, and young adults.
 - b. Learn about various parenting responses given a child's age.
 - c. Develop an appreciation for midlife and end-of-life transitions.
- 2. Prepare for one's own developmental path and consider the future.
- 3. Understand the biology behind early life span development and sociology (with biological limits) of later life span development.

Course Requirements

This course is asynchronous allowing students flexibility to work around other courses, clinical placements, and work. Students are responsible for reading the assigned chapters and watching Loom videos posted by the instructor. Please read below regarding the graded tasks for the course.

Loom lectures are for enrolled students only. Permission to post any audio/visual recording of the instructor on social media (e.g., tiktok, YouTube) IS NOT granted and a violation of the instructor's privacy. Any student caught posting a video(s) of the instructor will be dropped from the course and receive a grade of "F." In addition, the behavior will be reported to the proper university authorities for discipline.

Grades will be based on your performance on 4 exams.

(400 Points) Each **Exam** will be worth 100 points and students have **2 attempts** (highest grade will be recorded). All four exams will be multiple choice with each question randomly selected from the large test bank. This means no two students will see the same exam. In addition, the second attempt will likely contain few if any of the same questions as attempt 1. Students are encouraged to take the first attempt early in the test period so preparation can be adjusted for a much higher performance on the second exam.

(5 Points) Participation post-Posting questions or answers (zero points) for the modules. Each section will have a discussion for posting questions about the material. I will try to answer questions within 36 hours. Please do not post questions the evening before a test closes and expect a response. Classmates may post answers or clarifications also ©

Desire-to-Learn (D2L)

Extensive use of the MSU D2L program is a part of this course. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, and general course information. You can log into D2L through the MSU Homepage. If you experience difficulties, please contact the technicians listed for the program or contact your instructor.

Your exams require the LockDown Browser and a Webcam. Most of the time you will not encounter any problems, however, listed below are some common issues.

- 1. Make sure you have the most recent version of the <u>LockDown Browser</u> on your computer. You can install the latest version at the link above or here: https://msutexas.edu/distance/lockdown-browser.php
- 2. The most common issue is the loss of connection during the test. If you get a blank page or a spinning wheel, you will need to exit the test, close the browser, and re-enter the test.
- 3. If you are taking this test at home, it is best that no other device is being used that requires the Internet while you are taking the test.
- 4. Chromebook Laptops are NOT compatible with the LockDown Browser, so you will need to locate a different device. If you have the ability to come to campus, the LockDown Browser is on the computers in the Clark Student Center lab and the first floor Dillard lab. Note: There are no cameras on these computers, you will need to bring your own webcam or check one out from the Library.

Please be aware of:

- The LockDown Browser flags problematic behavior like going off camera, talking, or even being back lit. The instructor gets an alert. All moderate and high alert notifications result in the video being watched for evidence of academic dishonesty. Please don't sit with a lamp or bright light behind you as the camera has a hard time reading your face.
- 2. Please do not take an exam with anyone else present. If you are in an MSU computer lab, we understand that other people may be around. Please don't have conversations with them until after you complete the exam.
- 3. The environment scans are not acceptable in many cases. Students are to show the room including the desk/table top and the wall behind the computer. Students who fail to properly scan the environment are watched very closely. Any behavior that appears like a person is looking at notes or another device may be reported as academic dishonesty.

Smoking/Tobacco Policy

Student Code of Conduct

MWSU's official policy in the University's Code of Student Conduct on page 52, states:

Instructor Drop: An instructor may drop a student any time during the semester for excessive absences, for consistently failing to meet class assignments, for an indifferent attitude, or for disruptive conduct. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to dropping

the student from the class. An instructor's drop of a student takes precedence over the student-initiated course drop of a later date. The instructor will assign a grade of either WF or F through the first 9 weeks of a long semester, the first 6 weeks of a 10-week summer term, or the 12th class day of a 4- or 5-week summer term consisting of 20 days. After these periods, the grade will be an F. The date the instructor drop form is received in the Office of the Registrar as the official drop date. A student dropped from a class by a faculty member for disruptive behavior has the right of appeal to the Student Conduct Committee through the Student Conduct office.
