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Course Description

This course provides a general introduction to some of the key themes, topics, and current issues relevant to population health, with a focus on vulnerable populations across the globe. This course will explore family, group, and population dynamics from a variety of theoretical perspectives. A clinical practicum in the community setting provides an opportunity to develop theory-based population assessment, diagnoses, and plans relevant to advanced nursing practice.

Graded Assignments

Quizzes

There will be four quizzes over the course readings. The quizzes include multiple choice and select all that apply questions. The quizzes are timed. You will have two attempts, and the highest grade will be recorded. Quizzes are open for completion for one week (7 days), i.e., Monday 0001 through Sunday 11:59 PM of the quiz due date and time. Students are encouraged to plan accordingly to allow for sufficient time to take the exam. The due dates are outlined in the course calendar.

Discussion Boards

There will be a total of six (6) discussions, excluding the introduction forum. The purpose of each discussion is to help the student focus on the health of a population through assessment of demographic characteristics, evaluating social determinants of health for a population, identifying health risk factors for specific populations, appraising evidence-based promotion/disease prevention strategies, and identifying valid sources of population health statistics. Each student will need to post an initial substantive post by Wednesday 11:59 PM and responses by Sunday 11:59 PM of each discussion week. Students are required to respond to at least two of their peer's initial posts, and No responses will be permitted after the discussion closes. Refer to the *Discussion Grade Rubric* for grading criteria which can be found in the course D2L.

Projects Required

There is a Midterm and Final project due in this course. The due dates are listed in the course calendar. The specifications and grading rubrics for each project are included in the modules on D2L. Links to online websites to help you complete each project are included on the course calendar.

Extra Credit

Extra credit is not permitted in the nursing program. No extra credit will be offered or accepted.

Late Work

All assignments are due at 2359 (11:59 PM) on the day due unless otherwise specified. Students are expected to submit assignments by the time they are due. Assignments submitted after the due date and time will receive a deduction of 10 total points possible for that assignment for each day the assignment is late. Assignments will be accepted, with penalty as described, up to a maximum of three days late, after which grade of zero will be recorded for the assignment. Students may request an extension by contacting the faculty via email prior to the due date and time. Extensions will not be granted on or after the due date. Extensions will not be granted on discussion responses to peers or after the close of a quiz.

Make Up Work/Tests

Make up work is not available. Assignment due dates are outlined in the course calendar.

Academic Dishonesty

Standards of Professional Conduct for Graduate Nursing Students

Students are expected to uphold standards of professional conduct in the classroom, online, and in clinical settings. Change of Schedule
