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EVALUATION AND ASSIGNMENTS

Mandatory Class Attendance: (30 pts). Weekly attendance for this class is mandatory, no exceptions. This class works on the verbal and non-verbal skills that you will use with your clients. In the event of an emergency, you must contact your instructor prior to class to make arrangements. *Individual circumstances will be assessed by the instructor to determine if the event is an emergency.* Points will be deducted from your grade if prior arrangements are not made. A make-up assignment is required if you miss a class for emergencies purposes. You will be required to film yourself via zoom or other means and send it via email to your faculty. The video should consist of the following discussion:

1. Discuss **each skill** that was discussed in the missed class period. You should talk about (1) when you would use it with the client (2) the purpose of the skill (3) and give 3 examples of each skill and what it would sound like in a session with a client. For example: A reflection of feeling may sound like- "I can see how frustrated you are about...."

Discussions/Mini-Video Discussions and Comments: (29 total pts.) Students are required to answer questions or complete assignments (video upload; these are worth more points) regularly related to the weekly reading. Almost every week students will be required to answer questions about the reading or be asked to reflect on a particular topic for that week. Students will also be required to film short min-videos for class, instead of questions about the readings. If there is a discussion, students are required to participate and comment on at least one other person's thread. **The assignments and weekly comments are due by Sunday at 11:59 pm at the end of the week except for the last week.** Follow directions to get full points each week. Late work will not be accepted

Theories and Techniques Paper: (16 pts.) *A guide is provided in the course shell.* Students will write demonstrate the knowledge gained from the textbook, other textbooks, and academic articles throughout the course. Students will write a paper on a foundational theory and its associated techniques. *Papers must be in APA style and include a minimum of 5 peer-reviewed references.* The paper should address the following:

Your paper should cover the areas below:

- I. Describe your Theory of Choice and include its history and progression. This should include specific theorists who were essential in the progression of the theory.
- II. Describe the Techniques associated with your theory of choice and how they are applied in the counseling session, including their purpose. Be mindful that theories such a person centered do not have their own techniques.
- III. What is the full process of counseling according to your theory. Are there stages of counseling, etc?
- IV. How will you observe and assess your clients using the theory of choice.
- V. Describe the role of a counselor using evidence-based practices. Your theories textbook will be a good place to find out what the role of counseling is and what it means.
- VI. Discuss the importance of self-awareness as a counselor to include your personal biases (we all have some).
- VII. Discuss how you will manage yourself as a counselor knowing your strengths, weaknesses, and biases.
- VIII. Discuss the importance of a case conceptualization with a client and its purpose.

IX. Describe what it means to use evidence-based practices and why it is important for counselors and their clients.

Counseling Session Video and Skills Evaluation Form: (20 pts.) Students please review the counseling session packet provided in the course shell. Students will record themselves via zoom doing a **20-minute** counseling session with a peer from class. *Students must conduct the session using the counseling microskills learned in class.* In addition, they should *manage the session using a theoretical framework and include 1 theory-based counseling technique.* Students must fill out and sign the clinical video or observation consent form for themselves. Both the video and form must be uploaded in the d2l dropbox. *Please provide a google drive link to your video in the dropbox. Ensure that anyone with the link can have access to the video for grading. Only the form is uploaded to tk20 in addition to d2l.*

Recorded Transcript Assignment: (24 pts) Students will transcribe 7-10 minutes of their counseling video and follow the form provided in the course shell. Students will correct their transcript to show the use of higher order microskills and techniques.

Reflection Paper: (20 pts) Students will reflect on their work during the semester, including their growth as a counselor. Students will use the guide provided in the course shell and answer all required questions.
