Goals

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

1. Identify, describe, and compare major theoretical approaches to motivation and emotion, and explain how these theories account for variation in human thought, feeling, and behavior.
2. Use theoretical concepts from motivation and emotion research to interpret real-world behavior, including goal pursuit, self-regulation, belief systems, and emotional responses.

Course Overview

This is an online course, meaning that we will not meet in person. The course is organized around weekly modules, with each devoted to a single chapter from the textbook. **A detailed schedule of readings and due dates is provided at the end of the syllabus.**

Each week, students are expected to read the assigned textbook chapter and watch the corresponding recorded lecture, which will guide you through the key concepts and accompanying PowerPoint slides.

Most weeks will include an assignment due on Friday, typically in the form of a short multiple-choice quiz assessing comprehension of the chapter

material. To help you stay on track, I will post a weekly announcement in D2L every Monday outlining the tasks, deadlines, and expectations for that week.

Course Requirements

Lectures are for enrolled students only. Permission to post any audio/visual recording of the instructor on social media (e.g., tiktok, YouTube) IS NOT granted and a violation of the instructor's privacy. Any student caught posting a video(s) of the instructor will be dropped from the course and receive a grade of "F." In addition, the behavior will be reported to the proper university authorities for discipline.

Grades will be based on your performance, 4 exams, 9 Assignments, and a research requirement.

(200 points-50 points each) Each **exam** will be worth 50 points. Tests will be multiple choice and taken online. I reserve the right to add essay questions at any point during the semester.

Note: Exams will be taken in D2L and open for 24 hours. Students who do not have access to a computer/tablet and/or internet at home can take the exam at the Clark Student Center computer lab or the first floor Dillard computer lab. Lack of access to a computer/tablet and/or internet is not an excuse for failing to take an exam. Questions will be randomly chosen from the test bank. Each exam will last 60 minutes, only one test question will show on the screen, but you will be able to go back and see past questions.

(110 Points) Assignments- 11 quizzes/assignments will be worth 10 points each.

Student Code of Conduct

MWSU's official policy in the University's Code of Student Conduct on page 52, states:

Instructor Drop: An instructor may drop a student any time during the semester for excessive absences, for consistently failing to meet class assignments, for an indifferent attitude, or for disruptive conduct. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to dropping the student from the class. An instructor's drop of a student takes precedence over the student-initiated course drop of a later date. The instructor will assign a grade of either WF or F through the first 9 weeks of a long semester, the first 6 weeks of a 10-week summer term, or the 12th class day of a 4- or 5-week summer term consisting of 20 days. After these periods, the grade will be an F. The date the instructor drop form is received in the Office of the Registrar as the official drop date.
