Texas Core Curriculum:

This course fulfills a core requirement for Communication. As such, the course will assess the following THECB Core Course Objectives:

- Critical Thinking Skills: To assess the student's critical thinking skills, the Synthesis rubric will be applied to the Synthesis Paper.
- Communication Skills: To assess the student's written communication skills, the Synthesis rubric will be applied to the Synthesis Paper.
- Personal Responsibility: To assess ethical use of sources as a measure of personal responsibility, the Synthesis rubric will be applied to the Synthesis Paper.
- Teamwork: To assess the student's teamwork, the Peer Review Teamwork rubric will be used to assess each student's preparation for and participation in peer review workshops.

Course Goals:

- Apply key rhetorical concepts through analyzing and composing a variety of texts
- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, collaboration, and revision
- Use reading and composing for inquiry, learning, thinking, and communication in various rhetorical contexts
- Use strategies such as interpretation, synthesis, response, critique, and design to compose texts that integrate the writer's ideas with those from appropriate sources
- Use sources ethically and in contextually appropriate ways and follow a designated style guide
- Demonstrate proficient use of linguistic structures, including grammar and mechanics, through practice in composing and revising

Course Assignments:

You will receive detailed assignment sheets that explain the specifics for each of these assignments.

Response Papers

These short essays (2 paragraphs) will be written in response to articles that we read and discuss together. These are worth ***20%** of your final grade.

Rhetorical Analysis

You will have the opportunity to plan, draft, and revise this essay. It will analyse the rhetorical elements of a text. This is worth ***15%** of your final grade.

Position Paper

You will have the opportunity to plan, draft, and revise this essay. It will make a claim that is supported with evidence and fully developed reasoning. This is worth ***15%** of your final grade.

Annotated Bibliography

You will summarize and evaluate each source that you consult for the synthesis paper. This is worth ***10%** of your final grade.

Synthesis Paper

This is the longest paper you will compose in this class. It will explore various perspectives on a topic of your choosing. You will cite sources and show connections between them. This is worth ***20%** of your final grade.

Discussion Boards

Participation in regular discussion boards about varying topics including: readings, topic brainstorm, & peer reviews. For each discussion board, your initial post should be posted by Wednesday @11:59 pm and your **two** peer responses should be posted by Friday @11:59 pm. There are no word count requirements; however, both posts (initial & response) should be of substance (probably about 200 words). These are worth ***10%** of your final grade.

Remix Project

You will present your synthesis paper to the class using multimodal text. This is worth ***10%** of your final grade.
