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Course Description

Class instruction in piano for students with no previous background; emphasis on the development of fundamental skills. Majors/minors only.

Course Objectives

Music majors and minors with little or no piano performance background learn fundamental piano performance skills. Students develop personal musicianship and keyboard skills necessary to pass keyboard proficiency requirements. Students will:

- Learn keyboard techniques including posture, hand position, and finger patterns
- Sight-read simple music using both hands (i.e. folk songs)
- Develop musicianship skills including ear training and rhythm reading
- Learn major scales
- Harmonize and improvise accompaniment to simple songs
- Learn the chord progressions
- Transpose simple melodies
- Perform simple pieces hands together
- Implement basic music theory into piano performance

Homework

Students will receive assignments weekly to prepare from *Alfred's Group Piano* or supplemental resources. Students are expected to practice regularly outside of class to complete these assignments and pass assigned proficiencies.

Quizzes

All quizzes will be short playing quizzes to help students prepare for the assigned proficiencies and performance pieces.

Projects Required

During the semester, students will prepare one piece for an informal final performance at the end of the semester. Students will also work on one ensemble piece for performance.

Mid-Term and Final Exam

Students will perform Piano Proficiencies at midterm (October 19) and during the university final exam time for the class.

- Piano Class 4: prepared melody with accompaniment, sight reading, transposition, prepared piece

Late Work

Late work will be accepted, however, ten percentage points will be deducted from the grade for each week it is late, up to 40 percentage points.

Make Up Work/Tests

Make-up work is allowed, however, ten percentage points will be automatically deducted from the grade. The only exceptions to this deduction are legitimate emergency situations and approved absences.

Attendance

Piano Class 1 is a performance and participation class, with daily individual and group activities. These activities build on one another to develop skills and help students learn concepts. Therefore, attendance is crucial to personal development.

Each student is allowed two unexcused absences—after this, each unexcused absence will lower the attendance grade by 5%. If you have an emergency and must be absent, please let me know in advance, and make sure to do any make-up work from the day you miss.

Online Computer Requirements

This is a face-to-face class, with most of the work done at the keyboard. D2L will be used for grades, important information, and additional practice resources. Students need to have a reliable way to access the internet away from the classroom in order to check grades and use any online resources provided.

Instructor Class Policies

Piano Class I is an opportunity for students to develop keyboard and musicianship skills in a supportive, encouraging environment. In order to make this possible, everyone needs to be engaged and committed. Therefore I ask that you abide by the following policies.

- Practice outside of class—I can’t stress this enough. In order to make any real progress, you need to be practicing on a daily basis.
- Arrive on time for class, set up and ready to go.
- Refrain from cellphone usage during class—this is one of the quickest and easiest ways to eliminate distraction and improve focus.
- Treat other students and the instructor with respect, so that everyone can feel comfortable and thrive in our classes.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer

semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester.
