Course Description

This course investigates the various cultures and ethnicities during the colonial period in Latin America. The discovery, conquest, and settlement of Ibero-America are covered in detail as are the roles of the church, encomienda, and military. The course concludes with a discussion of the impact of the reforms of Charles the Third as they affected Latin America and initiated the independence movements.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes/Course Competencies

During this course, students will learn how to:

 identify key events, peoples, individuals, terms, periods, and chronology of the history of Latin America distinguish between historical fact and historical interpretation; and connect historical events in chronological chain(s) of cause and effect

- 2. develop critical thinking skills by discussing the living nature of history, using historical evidence to critique competing interpretations of the same historical events, explaining the nature of historical controversies
- 3. synthesize diverse historical information and evidence related to broad themes of Colonial Latin American History and present this information in coherent, well-articulated, and well-substantiated analytical discussions and other written assignments
- 4. practice skills related to the craft of History: writing book reviews and conference papers as well as presenting
- 5. learn some cool Spanish words and terms to impress your friends

Homework

Homework for this class is mostly limited to readings from the assigned textbook or handouts (available on D2L) and should be completed on the day listed.

Projects Required

There are four projects for this course: a one-page paper on what you think it means to be civilized, a one to two-page book review, a conference-style paper on the topic of your choice (related to Colonial Latin America), and a conference style presentation to go along with your paper.

Mid-Term Exam

Mid-Term exams will have two components: An identification section where you are asked to identify key terms discussed in class and an essay section were you right about the broader theme of the class. The exam should not take more than fifty minutes to complete and is worth 100 points or 10 percent of your grade.

Final Exam

The Final Exam will be exactly like the mid-term exam in format with two section an identification section and an essay section. The essay will be cumulative, and I will ask you a question about the larger scope of the class. The exam should not take you more than fifty minutes and is worth 100 points or 10 percent of your grade.

Extra Credit

I do not grant individual extra credit, but may offer extra credit for attending a guest lecture or something of that nature (but do not have anything planned at this time)

Late Work
