**Materials:** Student may be asked to purchase music books at the instructor's discretion. However, most students enrolled will use materials provided by the instructor.

**Course Description:** This class gives private one on one instruction in double bass. It is intended for music majors, minors, and non-majors. The emphasis is on building sound technique, developing strength in the right and left hand technique, bow hold, literature, performance skills, and pedagogy.

- 1. The student will be able to perform scales commiserate with their rate of development.
- 2. The student will master technical exercises.
- 3. The student will develop endurance and range.
- 4. The student will develop their tone.
- 5. The student will increase the level of sight reading skills.
- 6. Student will develop performance skills.
- 7. The student will be exposed to double bass literature
